Permit Requirement Checklist

(Non-Residential Facilities Only)

This document is intended to assist businesses and to provide guidance regarding the permit requirements of the Air District. This checklist is for guidance only and may require District review. Please answer each of the following questions. If you are not certain of the answer, check "Yes"

1.	Does your facility use any stationary internal combustion engine with a rating of at least 50 brake-horsepower (bhp)?		
2.	Does your facility perform mixing, blending, or processing of any organic solvents, adhesives, paints, fertilizers, or coatings?		
3.	Does your facility create dust, smoke, or incinerate any materials?		
4.	Does your facility refine any liquids or solids or reclaim any metals?		
5.	Does your facility paint, plate, or coat anything?		
6.	Does your facility have any combustion equipment? (e.g., boilers, ovens, furnaces, etc.)		
7.	Does your facility handle or store any solvents or motor fuels?		
8.	Are any acids used or stored at your facility?		
9.	Are any chemical processes used at your facility?		
10	. Are any solvents dispensed or used for cleanup at your facility?		
11.	. Is this facility on the list of types of operations which typically require a permit? (See the attached list of operations which typically require a permit)		
12	Are you conducting a renovation or demolition in which over 160 square feet of building materials, more than 260 linear feet of insulated pipe or non-metallic pipe or similar material, or more than 35 cubic feet of other building material are going to be disturbed?		
13	. Will one or more acres of land be disturbed as a part of this project or more than 2,500 cubic yards of material be excavated or relocated on any 3 days during this project?

Air Pollution Permit Information Sheet

California State law requires city and county building departments to determine whether building permit applicants have met or are meeting the requirements of Section 42303 of the California Health and Safety Code.

This information is being distributed to owners and operators of equipment that may be subject to air pollution regulations and is designed to provide guidance regarding the permit requirements of the San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District (District).

District Rule 2010 – *Permits Required* requires that before any person builds, erects, installs, modifies, uses, or operates any article, machine, equipment, or other contrivance, the use of which may cause, reduce, or control the emission of air contaminants, such person shall first secure a permit from the District. In addition, the District must be notified whenever such equipment is sold, transferred, or relocated. The District serves as the permitting agency for direct stationary sources of air pollution. Pollutants of interest include:

- Volatile Organic Compounds (VOC)
- Oxides of Nitrogen (NOx)
- Oxides of Sulfur (SOx)
- Carbon Monoxide (CO)

- Particulate Matter (PM)
- Any Odorous Compounds
- Smoke
- Dust
- Toxic Air Contaminants (any compounds regulated by the California Air Resources Board under the California Health and Safety Code)
- Hazardous Air Pollutants (any compounds identified by the Environmental Protection Agency in Section 112(b) of the Federal Clean Air Act)

Operations which typically require a permit include:

- Operations with air pollution control equipment
- Asphalt and Portland cement concrete batching operations
- Auto body paint shops
- Adhesive operations
- Combustion equipment
- Coating, plating, painting, and printing operations
- Cotton gins
- Confined animal feeding operations
- Composting operations
- · Commercial bakeries
- Commercial chain-driven charbroilers
- · Commodity fumigation
- Dry cleaning operations
- Feed or grain milling or handling operations

- Gasoline stations or any gasoline storage and dispensing operations
- Metal or plastic cutting operations
- Nut processing
- Oil or natural gas drilling or producing operations
- Organic and inorganic liquid storage and fermentation operations
- Sand and gravel crushing, screening, or handling operations Solid waste disposal sites
- · Solvent cleaning or degreasing operations
- Soil remediation
- Stationary internal combustion engines > 50 brake-horsepower (bhp)Wood furniture or cabinet making shops
- · Waste water treatment plants
- Any equipment or operation including any of the following substances:
 - Asbestos
- Fluorides

Mercury

- Beryllium
- Hexavalent chromium

Sulfuric acid mist

- Benzene
- Hydrogen sulfide or other sulfur compounds
- Vinyl chloride
