Historic Architecture Survey Report

Huntington Boulevard, Fresno CA



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Summary

Huntington Boulevard, located on the east side of Fresno's original parent grid, is the heart of one of Fresno's most architecturally distinct neighborhoods. Grand homes, in a variety of styles, stand side-by-side with more modest bungalows, all facing onto a Page | 2 wide boulevard bisected by a grassy median. Roosevelt High School, first constructed in 1928, is located at the east end of the boulevard at the intersection of E. Huntington Boulevard and Cedar. The Boulevard is the center of the "Alta Vista Tract" which was first platted in 1911. The street was marketed to Fresno's leading citizens and has been a preferred residence for business, education, and political leaders for the last 100 years. It has been described as one of the great boulevards in the world by Berkeley Professor and San Francisco architect Daniel Solomon.

This Historic Architectural Survey Report and District Nomination were prepared by the City's Historic Preservation Project Manager, Karana Hattersley-Drayton, who meets the Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualifications as both a Historian and Architectural Historian. The survey included the 121 residential properties lining the boulevard from First to Cedar (formerly 12th Street). All of the properties are singlefamily residences and most are owner-occupied. Of the 121 properties, 116 are considered eligible as contributors to a proposed Huntington Boulevard Historic District pursuant to the City's Historic Preservation Ordinance (FMC 12-1600 et seq). The 5 non-contributors are ineligible as they have lost integrity to their period of significance due to significant alterations. The period of significance is 1914-1977.

Research Methods

In 2003, Karana Hattersley-Drayton and Historic Preservation Commissioner, Kevin Enns-Rempel, attended a meeting with several Huntington Boulevard residents, (then) Council Member Mike Dages and his Chief of Staff, Sal Quintero. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the potential for listing Huntington Boulevard as a District on the Local Register of Historic Resources. An interest in celebrating and preserving the architectural character of the boulevard, however, predated this 2003 meeting. In 1994 the Huntington Boulevard Homeowners' Association submitted an application for a National Register Historic District to the State Office of Historic Preservation. The nomination was returned for revisions and was not resubmitted. Nevertheless, the research for the NR document has proved invaluable in preparing this Local Register nomination.

Following additional conversations and e-mail correspondence, the Local Register District concept was not pursued further until 2008 when a new effort was launched and supported by the Association. On August 27, 2008 a neighborhood meeting was organized with approximately 30 property owners in attendance. Ms. Hattersley-Drayton met with the group and answered questions about the benefits and constraints Page | 3 of historic designation. Following this meeting the Board appointed a committee chaired by former City of Fresno Housing and Neighborhood Revitalization Manager, Dave Herb (who lives in the first home constructed on the boulevard). By October 2008 Mr. Herb and committee had collected 93 signed permission forms from property owners requesting to have their homes included in a District. Due to concerns from one family in particular, the Committee met with City staff who ultimately prepared a draft Conservation Plan, a step normally taken once a District has actually been designated by the City Council.

The Initial application for a Huntington Boulevard Historic District was presented to the City's Historic Preservation Commission at a noticed public hearing, January 26, 2009. This application was approved by the HPC on a vote of 4-0. In November of 2009 City staff supported a Fresno Historical Society Huntington Boulevard home tour and organized a forum, "Greening Up Your Historic Home." As part of this collaborative effort, city staff procured the services of artist Michael Wrigley who designed a poster and survey report cover for Huntington Boulevard.

Thereafter, all building permits for the 121 properties were copied and individual files were created for each home. Information from the prior National Register research was included in each file. Building by building survey work began in June of 2010 but was short lived, due to numerous other projects and priorities by the City and the Development community, including High Speed Rail survey reviews, the proposed Bus Rapid Transit Project, the Fulton Corridor Historic Survey, Downtown and General Plan updates, etc. In 2013 most of these new plans had been created and reviewed and by summer there was additional time to continue the survey work.

In the summer of 2014 seven homes deemed eligible for individual listing on the Local Register were brought to the Historic Preservation Commission and ultimately to the City Council for designation. Channel 30 provided news coverage on the seven newly designated historic resources and this publicity created additional good will for the proposed District. On October 16, 2014, Ms. Hattersley-Drayton completed the initial survey and began the process of "ground-truthing" all properties for any changes since the homes were first surveyed and for consistency in architectural terminology. This process was completed in early March of 2015. Additionally, the A.G. and Henrietta Wishon Home was designated to the Local Register on March 26, 2015.

A neighborhood meeting was held Wednesday March 25th, 2015 at the Jackson School, with approximately 30 property owners (and family members) in attendance. On Monday, April 27th the Final Application for a proposed Huntington Boulevard Historic District was reviewed by the City's Historic Preservation Commission. Following public testimony the Commission approved the Application on a vote of 5-0 and the Page | 4 proposed District was forwarded to the Fresno City Council for a hearing.

The proposed Huntington Boulevard Historic District was reviewed by the Fresno City Council at a public hearing on Thursday, May 21st. The Council adopted the following resolution 7-0:

"Councilmember Quintero made a motion to accept staff recommendation to adopt the attached resolution to approve the Formal Application for a Huntington Boulevard Historic District. Anyone who wants to opt out can do so if they state it on the record tonight and they will be out. The Planning Director will send a letter to each of the remaining homeowners in the district with a form they must fill out and have the form notarized and return to the City within 30 days indicating they want to opt out and they will be excluded from the district too. The motion was seconded by Council President Baines."

Jennifer Clark, Director of the City's Development and Resource Management Department, sent a letter to all the 122 property owners on May 29th explaining the actions of the Council, the benefits of listing within a historic district and providing property owners with a form that they could submit should they wish to be excluded from the District. By the deadline, June 30th, 38 property owners, representing 37 residential buildings and one vacant parcel, had responded with a notarized request to be excluded from the District. These properties were henceforth removed from the boundaries which were redrawn to include 84 parcels, of which 80 are contributors to the historic district and 4 are non-contributors.

Survey work: Unlike individual properties considered for the Local Register, most of the Huntington Boulevard properties were evaluated from the right-of-way only. Preservation is normally concerned with the street elevations of a property, rather than say an addition on the rear of the building or a modernized kitchen. Thus architectural descriptions are usually only for the character-defining features of each The plan of the home and even property which were easily seen from the sidewalk. the location of the garage were ascertained from the "Front Counter" program available to city staff which depicts aerials of the properties.

In perusing the building permits it was interesting to see that permits for several homes were first issued for the garage. Whether the garage then served to store

materials for the house construction or as a temporary residence is unknown. All properties were generally named for the original owners, including both the husband and wife's name, as appropriate. In a few cases, a property might be named for two parties, when both lived at the home for an extended period and were noteworthy for some reason. Assigned building dates came from original building permits or Page | 5 specifically when available from the certificate of completion (as an original building permit might be pulled in 1948 but the house not completed until the next year.)

It should be noted that the entirety of the Alta Vista Tract, including Huntington Boulevard, has been found eligible as a District to the National Register of Historic Places through a Section 106 consultation with the State Office of Historic Preservation. This consultation was necessitated by use of HUD funds for rehabilitation of properties within the neighborhood (SHPO Letter 26 September 2013). Any use of federal funds for restoration or rehabilitation of properties within the District will by necessity follow the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties.

Thanks: This seven year effort was supported by numerous colleagues who deserve thanks: Dave Herb, Jeanette Jurkovich, Tony Terzian and the Huntington Boulevard committee gathered signatures from the residents, attended numerous meetings, and kept up the pressure to finish the District survey work. Christopher Preciado, architect and Planner with the City, accompanied Ms. Hattersley-Drayton one morning and prepared several survey forms. Interns Austin Hall (U.C. Santa Cruz), Arami Matevosyan and Sean Andersen (U.C. Berkeley) also contributed to the effort by providing archival research. Ms. Matevosyan worked with Ms. Drayton to design an architectural terminology brochure which included several examples from Huntington Finally, the earlier National Register research work of Ann and Grant Schreiber was critical, particularly in naming properties and providing the brief history of each. Mrs. Schreiber died in 2014. This historic survey report is dedicated to her memory.

Historic Overview

Early History and Development of Fresno

The Yokuts were the first residents of the Fresno area, with small tribes occupying the floodplains of the Big Dry Creek and Little Dry Creek (Gayton 1948:153; Latta 1997:163). Although there were no missions established in the Valley, there were small Mexican era settlements including Pueblo de las Junta, located at the confluence of the San Joaquin River and the Fresno Slough (Hoover 1990: 86). The Spanish and Mexican influence is indicated through place names such as "Fresno," which means "ash tree" and which was first applied to the Fresno River (Hoover et al 1990:85). Following the Gold Rush of 1849, miners were drawn to the southern gold fields, and cattle ranchers and dryland farmers moved into the area. Three momentous changes occurred in the 1870s, which dramatically changed settlement patterns and history: the construction of the Central Pacific Railroad, the introduction of agricultural colonies and the concomitant development of a labyrinth of canals to bring water to these colonies.

In 1870 the Central Pacific Railroad began its diagonal push down the San Joaquin Valley. New towns were surveyed along the corridor—several were planned by the railroad itself—and earlier villages situated away from the tracks often vanished overnight. In 1872 the railroad reached what is now Fresno. The Contract and Finance Company, a subsidiary of the Central Pacific Railroad, bought 4,480 acres in a desolate area where Dry Creek drained into the plains. Surveyor Edward H. Mix laid out the new town in blocks 320 feet by 400 feet, with 20 foot alleys, lots 25 x 150 feet fronting on 80-foot wide streets parallel to and on both sides of the tracks (Clough 1984:121). The gridiron plan was filed in 1873 and was remarkably rigid, broken only by the space reserved for a future courthouse and the broad swaths through the center of town for the tracks, depot and yards (Reps 1979:187).

Fresno's location was uninviting at best, with barren sand plains in all directions. The nearest substantial supply of water was the San Joaquin River, 10 miles to the north (Reps 1979:187) and the Kings River further south. Fresno grew slowly but in 1874 it was able to wrestle the county seat away from the former mining town of Millerton (Hoover 1990:88). The population of Fresno in 1875 was 600, with a third of the residents Chinese who lived west of the tracks. In 1878 a new resident, R.W. Riggs described the community as "not much of a town, a handful of houses in a desert of sand" (Reps 1979:187). Fresno's population was 1,112 in 1880 and 3,464 in 1885. "Yet the town remained a collection of buildings on the prairie rather than a full-fledged city. There was no police force, sewer system or truly efficient fire department, and

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cattle were still roaming the dusty streets that became winter lakes" (Clough 1984:141).

The "west" side of the Southern Pacific tracks quickly became "Chinatown," where Chinese, as well as disreputable whites, were forced to settle. The 1898 Sanborn Map shows a remarkably dense in-fill of saloons, lodging houses, lottery and gambling parlors between G, Mariposa, F and Kern Streets. A Chinese theatre is noted on China Alley and a Joss House faced G Street (1898 Sanborn Map of Fresno).

In addition to Chinese and Scandinavian farmers, other early ethnic groups in the Fresno area included Germans from Russia, Japanese and Armenians. Volga Germans from Russia first came to Fresno in 1887, seeking work as farm laborers. By 1920 there were approximately 8,000 Volga Germans in Fresno and by 1937 at least 8 churches serving the German-speaking population (*Germantown Context*:12). Although there were only 12 Japanese in Fresno in 1890, by 1900 there were 3,000 (Bulbulian 2001:34). The first Armenians arrived in 1881 and eventually settled in an area between the Santa Fe and Southern Pacific tracks appropriately called "Armenian Town" (Ibid. 37-38). African-Americans were also present early on and organized an African Methodist Church in 1882 (Clough 1984:137).

The raisin industry developed in the 1870s, after the scorching heat of 1875 dried grapes on the vine (Hoover 1990:91). Martin Theodore Kearney who left employment with the Central California Colony and eventually became one of the wealthiest

landowners in the area served as the President of the first California Raisin Growers Association from 1898 to 1904. The Sun-Maid Raisin Cooperative was founded in 1911 and became one of the most successful in America. Fresno became the principalpacking center for the raisin grape industry with numerous packinghouses in the city.

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In the early 20th century cotton became the county's "number one money-making crop." In 1910 the University of California's Kearney Station [located at what is now Kearney Park] tested several varieties of cotton for their applicability to the area's climate and soils. Fiber shortages during World War I encouraged the growth of a local cotton industry and in March 1918 the Fresno County Board of Supervisors selected the Pima variety for local production. The first cotton gin and drying mill in the County were built in 1918 by the California Products Company on the parcel now addressed at 3000 E. Butler Avenue in Fresno. The cotton came from a thirty-acre field about 15 miles south of Fresno (Clough 1986:169,175-6). Other crops such as figs and stone fruits helped to diversify the local economy and Fresno became the market town for a large portion of the San Joaquin Valley (Reps 1979:192).

From 1880 to 1885 the population of Fresno more than tripled from 1,112 to 3,464 inhabitants. As a consequence land speculators began to buy and subdivide land outside of Fresno's original town plan. Although the "parent grid" of the city was designed to be parallel to the Central Pacific corridor, these new tracts were surveyed to line up with the surrounding agricultural sections and laid out with streets oriented north-south and east-west. Thus today, when one crosses "Divisadero Street" it is necessary to make a 45% shift in entering the old part of the City. Odd-shaped triangular lots exist where the newer grid system meets the old. Divisadero Street itself was developed beginning in 1906.

Settlement north and east of the railroad town was facilitated by the development of streetcar lines; in particular the Forthcamp Avenue line along what is now Fulton Street. Large homes for Fresno's business elite were built along Forthcamp and Van Ness Avenues, the two main thoroughfares. The streets immediately west and east were lined, however, with homes built for families of more modest means and included both vernacular cottages and early bungalows built on speculation (Tower District Specific Plan 1991:3-10).

In anticipation of growth following World War I, Fresno's Board of Trustees hired Charles Henry Cheney to prepare a new city plan. Cheney was an architect and city planner from San Francisco and he filed his report on May 31, 1918. To quote former City Planning Director, George Kerber:

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"[His] report introduced many of the community development programs that influenced the city's physical growth and style, and established a progressive plan for orderly development. It not only introduced zoning and land use planning to Fresno, but Chaney [sic] also proposed a civic center, a street system to accommodate the growing use of the automobile, a park and recreation plan (including a park on the San Joaquin River), a scenic road and boulevard system, railroad consolidation and a union passenger and freight station, and downtown revitalization." (....) All plans that have been prepared for the city since 1918 have utilized Chaney's plan as the basis for Fresno" (Kerber in Clough et al 1986:11)

Fresno continued to grow following World War I and in 1930 had a population of 52,513 (Kerber 1986:9) During and after World War II there was a severe shortage of housing as thousands of homeless transients arrived looking for agricultural work. In addition, thousands of returning servicemen and their families also needed housing and in response to this need, new subdivisions sprang up north of Shields Avenue.

The first major Post-War subdivision completed was Mayfair, northeast of McKinley and the First Street intersection. Mayfair included the first of the suburban shopping centers (<u>Ibid</u>:14). The sudden growth, from a population of 60,685 in 1940 to 91,669 in 1950, created extraordinary pressure on both city and county planning officials. "There was no master plan; only zoning and a weak subdivision ordinance to address the multiple problems of growth. At the time Fresno County, which was approving most of the new subdivisions, including Mayfair, didn't even have a building code to establish minimum housing standards" (<u>Ibid</u>.) In 1944 the City Commission led an aggressive campaign to bring many of the new subdivisions into the City limits. "The city boundaries were a crazy and meaningless zigzag maze that wandered in and out of the growing suburbs... Large physical obstacles such as canals, railroad tracks and commercial or industrial districts encouraged the uneven growth" (Clough 1986:60-63).


By 1950 the economic function of Fresno had gradually evolved from an agricultural service center to a multifunction metropolitan community (Kerber 1986:9). Fresno is now a city of 500,000 and the center of the richest agricultural county in the United States (Haslam 1993:194).

The Alta Vista Tract

This grassy median down the middle of Huntington Boulevard is a reminder of why the Alta Vista Tract was developed. Although local historians have assumed that the residential subdivision came first---followed by the street car line down the middle of the street--- in fact the inverse is the case.

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
In 1902 local entrepreneur Albert Graves Wishon convinced three Los Angeles investors A. C. Balch, W. G. Kerckhoff and Henry E. Huntington, to purchase the faltering San Joaquin Power Company. In 1903 the new company was renamed San Joaquin Light and Power Corporation and included in its holdings the Fresno City Water Company and the Fresno City Railway. Wishon was appointed General Manager. The Railway was renamed the Fresno Traction Company and it controlled all the streetcar systems in Fresno (Clough 1986:248).



Wishon purchased and improved Recreation Park which was located near the present day University Medical Center at Cedar Avenue and Ventura Street. His plans included a bandstand, merry-go-round, dance hall, saloon, dog race track and a professional baseball team. In order to increase visitation to the park he needed a double track street car line but the business owners along Ventura were opposed as Page | 11 they feared a second track would hurt business due to the additional noise and potential danger to foot traffic. Wishon then struck a deal with the Pacific Improvement Company, which owned a 190-acre alfalfa field immediately east of downtown Fresno and north of Ventura Street. The agreement specified that the Fresno Traction Company was to lay a double track from downtown to First Street, then from First to Recreation Park by way of Mariposa Street. Mariposa was renamed "Huntington Boulevard" (Garcia 2003:8-9). The Sunnyside and Recreation Line adopted the new route down Huntington Boulevard and service began after 1907. Passenger service was discontinued on July 10, 1929 although freight trains ran down the street until 1939 (Hamm 1979: 55-56).


As with other streetcar suburbs around the United States, the land adjacent to the line became increasingly desirable for residential use; the option for a subdivision was clearly part of Wishon's vision (Garcia 2003:10). The "Alta Vista Tract" was mapped by William Stranahan for the Pacific Improvement Corporation, a subsidiary of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company, and officially platted in 1911 (AVRP 1991:1). The tract (advertised as the "Bon Ton Residence District") was annexed to the City on January 23, 1912 (Garcia 2003:15). The tract extended from First Street on the west to Twelfth Street (now Cedar Avenue) on the east, the north side of Balch Avenue and the south side of Platt Avenue east of Fifth Street and both sides of Platt Avenue to Twelfth Street. Residential parcels on the south side of Verrue Avenue were also included from Sixth to Twelfth (Alta Vista Tract Map Amended). James J. Murray Incorporated, a real estate and insurance corporation, announced that land had been subdivided and was immediately available for sale. Ads in the newspaper announced that all improvements would be installed free including cement sidewalks and curbs, graded streets, city water, gas, electricity and landscaping (Garcia 2003:15-16). In 1914 Billings and Meyering acquired the tract, completed the infrastructure and began to market the subdivision (AVRP 1991:1).

Albert Wishon purchased the first parcels in the new subdivision in 1912, a day after the official annexation, and he completed a beautiful Arts and Crafts inspired residence at the corner of Huntington Boulevard and Sixth Street in 1916. He envisioned an upscale, exclusive community. Livestock was limited to Platt Avenue which was also the only street zoned for commercial uses. The tract had building and racial covenants, including "No Asiatics". These covenants were included in deeds granted in 1919 and

revised in 1923 and 1926 with threats of reversion of ownership to either the Pacific Improvement Company or directly to Wishon and his wife if any of the conditions or restrictions were broken or ignored (Garcia 2003:16). By 1920 the Alta Vista Tract included 267 homes. A new grammar school was added on Kerckhoff Street in 1920, designed by Ernest J. Kump Sr. The Spanish Renaissance style school was later Page | 13 demolished and replaced with a modern facility (AVRP 1991:1). The side streets of the Tract (Balch, Kerckhoff, Platt and Verrue Avenues) filled in more quickly, as clearly depicted on the Sanborn Fire Insurance map of 1918. Huntington Boulevard, with its larger lots, developed more slowly, allowing for the greater architectural mix that one sees to this day. Original lots on Huntington accommodated only two houses per block, providing sufficient room for tennis courts and other amenities. These lots have since been subdivided; Wishon's property, as an example has been subdivided twice, both times to build homes for family members (Garcia 2003: 18-19).






Block 17, 1918 Sanborn Map with Wishon Home

Social History of Huntington Boulevard

Huntington Boulevard became a preferred location for Fresno's leading citizens. Albert Graves Wishon purchased the first lots in 1912 with a clear invitation to others to follow his lead and buy parcels in the new "Bon Temps" Residential District. However, Page | 15 the tract did not welcome "all," and racial covenants were included in deeds well into the 1920s (Garcia 2003:16) With the Sunnyside and Recreation Line streetcar in place, commuting to businesses downtown was easy and efficient.

The first residents on the boulevard were Dr. Oliver and Grace Howard (3263 E. Huntington, Block 20) who moved into a beautifully articulated Craftsman bungalow in 1914. The home included a carriage house (still extant). Dr. Howard was a dentist who began his practice in Fresno in 1901. From 1915 until his death in 1937 he maintained his dental office in the Bank of Italy Building on Fulton Street. Howard family members owned this home until 1978. David and Neva Newman appear to be the second residents on the block; a building permit was issued for their Italian Renaissance Revival home in 1914 but the home was not completed prior to the Dr. Howard home down the street. David Newman was the Manager of the Dry Good Department of the Kutner Goldstein Department Store; Neva was the owner of Maderin Studios in Fresno and Sacramento.

The Gottschalks Department Store was also well represented on the Boulevard. Abraham Blum, the President of this Fresno mercantile and his wife Mildred patterned their rambling Spanish Revival home at 3870 E. Huntington after properties they admired in Pasadena. Julian Oestreicher, brother-in-law to founder Emil Gottschalk, was the Vice President of the store and lived with his wife Tillie in an Italian Renaissance Revival home at 3401 E. Huntington. William Blayney, a display manager for Gottschalks and his wife Bess, also lived on the street.

Several property owners were involved with the lumber business including Aaron Maisler (3606), F. Rex Sporleder (3702), Harold Mansellan (3821), C.M. Prescott (3707) and Clarence Bernhauer (3428). Not surprisingly, the interiors of these homes are richly finished with exotic woods and superb craftsmanship. Ranchers, vintners, attorneys, teachers and newspaper employees were also well represented. Additionally, several architects and/or employees of major firms as well as developers chose Huntington Boulevard for their residences including former State Architect William D. Coates, Fred Swartz, Henry Shields and Robert Fisher. (See the District form for more information about property owners).

Architectural Styles on Huntington Boulevard

The Oxford English Dictionary defines architectural style as "a definite type of architecture, distinguished by special characteristics of structure and ornament." These "special characteristics" are also referred to as "character defining features," thus what helps to differentiate a Craftsman bungalow from say a Mid-century Ranch home. The original multi-sash windows, the porch balustrade, the Spanish tile roof of a home are all aspects of a building that property owners should strive to preserve and protect. But in talking about style we need to note a few caveats. Buildings are often a stylistic mix, as if the builder or homeowner went down to the lumber yard (or perused a catalogue) and grabbed a handful of this and a handful of that and threw it on the blank walls of Many styles, such as the Prairie, borrow from a the building under construction. variety of sources. Finally, it is important not to rely too heavily on style alone for classification. Some buildings may be plain and without articulation, but still have a rich cultural history such as the American Foursquare or the Hall-parlor cottage. It is therefore important to recognize type as well as style in discussing the architectural history of an area.

Huntington Boulevard developed more slowly than the other streets within the Alta Vista Tract with a concomitant diversity of architectural styles. The two most popular styles on the boulevard are the 1-story Craftsman bungalow and the Tudor, whether built as a cottage or in a more regal two-story form. The two styles tie in popularity with 26 examples of each. The later Minimal Traditional style home is represented in 11 examples, Spanish Eclectic in 10. What follows are brief descriptions of the most popular building styles that are found in the Alta Vista Tract, and specifically along Huntington Boulevard.

Arts and Crafts---Aesthetic and Philosophical Movement (c1900-1920)

The Arts and Crafts was an aesthetic and philosophical movement of the late 19th and early 20th centuries that profoundly influenced American architecture, design and lifestyle. The "Father" of the Movement was William Morris of England, a protégé of John Ruskin. Morris wanted to recapture the simpler life that had existed prior to the Industrial Revolution, a world in which craftsmanship was valued. In his utopian society architects would work in concert with other artists and would build using materials from the immediate environment. Nature was valued and historical copies of buildings were shunned in favor of new "free" versions.

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Arts and Crafts ideals for California were encapsulated in a 1904 publication by Charles Keeler, The Simple Home. Keeler made the tie between lifestyle and architecture clear: One "must live art before we can create it." Bay Area architects such as Bernard Maybeck, Ernest Coxhead and Julia Morgan, along with Charles and Henry Greene in Southern California drew upon a variety of sources for their arts and crafts Page | 17 inspired homes, including the California missions, English Tudor, the Swiss Chalet and Japanese indigenous building, as seen at both the 1893 and 1894 World's Fairs. Common themes were the use of wood, Romanticism, simplicity, and reliance on handcrafted furnishings and decorative elements. Only later in the 1920s and 30s would architects and designers embrace modernism and emulate the "machine age." The true Arts and Crafts home is a full two-story residence, often with stained shingles, cobblestone or clinker brick work. Four homes on Huntington can be termed an "Arts and Crafts" residence but the aesthetic was also applied to a variety of styles, including the Craftsman Bungalow and the Prairie.



Craftsman Bungalow. "Bungalow" is a traditional East Indian house (the word is Bengali) that included an open floor plan and wide verandas. Around 1905 the house form merged with the Arts and Crafts tradition to produce the craftsman bungalow. Character defining features include the one-story plan (the Airplane Bungalow with its second story, usually set back from the front elevation is an exception); wide overhanging eaves; projecting rafter tails; an informal floor plan that opens to the garden (and use of a pergola to bridge the home and garden); chimneys of cobblestone, or rough-faced brick; and piers or columns as porch supports. Many of the earliest homes along Huntington are bungalows.








<u>Prairie.</u> The "Prairie School" was a style of architecture and aesthetics that flourished in the American Midwest, c1900-1920 and is one of the few indigenous American styles. Character defining features include a full two-story plan; emphasis on horizontal lines with bands of wood, concrete coping or cast stone; low hipped roofs with overhanging eaves; clean masonry or stucco over masonry walls; a single story porch or porte Page | 18 cochere and use of natural materials.



Neoclassical architecture was initially inspired by the use of classicism at the 1893 Columbia Exposition. As applied to residences the style is characterized by a symmetrical façade; full front porch supported by classical columns; centrally placed doors with elaborate surrounds; boxed eaves with a moderate overhang, often with dentils or modillions beneath, and occasionally a wide frieze band; rectangular and double hung sash windows.



<u>Colonial Revival</u> refers to buildings that quote the domestic architecture of Colonial America, whether English, Dutch or even German in origin. Most Colonial Revival homes have a symmetrical facade with paired double hung sash windows usually with multi-pane glazing. The front door is often accented with a decorative pediment supported by pilasters and may have an overhead fanlight or sidelights.

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Spanish Eclectic (Spanish Colonial) was developed in 1913-1915 for the San Diego Panama-Pacific Exposition at Balboa Park. Distinguishing features of the Spanish Revival, which draws from a variety of Spanish architectural influences, include stucco wall surfaces often with ornate low-relief carvings, red tiled low pitched roofs, arcaded porches, Iron window grills and balconies and courtyard gardens. The style was popular in the United States in the 1920s and early 1930s and quickly passed from favor during the 1940s. The Spanish, Mission and Italian Villa styles often melded into a Mediterranean style which also featured a red tile roof usually with rounded or arched windows.



Italian Renaissance Revival. The Italian Renaissance was reintroduced for residential building in the late 19th century and closely replicated the palazzi of Northern Italy. Homes in this style are rigorously symmetrical, are a full two stories in height with a low pitched hip roof of ceramic tiles and have wide overhanging eaves with decorative brackets. The front entrance is classically articulated with fluted columns Page | 20 and pilasters.






The Monterey Revival is an adaptation of an architectural style Monterey Revival. that developed along California's central coast between 1835 and 1840. Monterey," became a popular revival in the 1920s. Always two-story, the most significant feature is the second story balcony which extends across the façade and is generally cantilevered over the first floor. There is only one example of a Monterey on the block.



Tudor Revival. The Tudor Revival style is loosely based on a variety of Medieval English prototypes. Characteristic of American houses is the steeply-pitched front facing gable and ornamental false half-timbering, or strapwork. Other features include tall narrow windows usually in multiple groups; multi-pane glazing; massive chimneys, commonly crowned by chimney pots; round-arched doorways with heavy board and Page | 21 batten doors. Windows are often casement but are also double-hung sash. The Tudor, including one story cottages, is popular along Huntington.





French Norman. The French Norman style was loosely based on the vernacular architecture of Normandy and Brittany and is often confused with the Tudor Revival. Character defining features include a round tower with steep conical roof which is frequently the focal point and main entrance for the residence and a steeply pitched roof with rolled composition shingles (to simulate thatching). French Norman style homes are fairly rare in Fresno. There is only one example of this style on the street.



Minimal Traditional style homes were built at the end of the Depression and through the 1950s. They mimic the form of prior Period Revival style buildings but are usually lacking in the decorative detailing. Roof pitch is low or intermediate and eaves are close rather than overhanging as in the Ranch style which followed. They often have a large chimney and one front-facing gable and may appear to be a simple version of a Page | 22 Tudor cottage.



Ranch. The Ranch home was developed in the mid-1930s by several California architects and was to a great extent a response to the growing reliance on the automobile. Thus unlike the Minimal Traditional style home, the Ranch sprawled across a larger lot and encompassed a built-in garage. Most Ranch homes are one story with low pitched roofs with either boxed or open eaves. Many have details borrowed from earlier traditions such as decorative shutters and iron or wooden post supports. Ribbon windows and expansive picture windows and large rear yards are other features of the Ranch.




Contemporary. The Contemporary style gained popularity between the years of 1950 and 1970. Contemporary homes represented a growing demand for housing that reflected the latest styles and materials including such modern features as aluminum frame windows, sliding-glass doors, interior courtyards, and carports or garages. Homes constructed in the Contemporary style often reflected a vernacular form of the Page | 23 International style with the characteristic flat roof, and absence of exterior decoration.



Interiors: The interiors of most homes were not accessed as the architectural survey was performed from the right-of-way. However, when viewed, older homes in particular were furnished with fireplaces with beautiful mantles and surrounds, pocket doors, built in cabinets and stained glass windows.





Landscape: Huntington Boulevard has been described as one of the great boulevards in the world by University of California Berkeley Professor and San Francisco architect Daniel Solomon. As with other landscaped streets throughout early Fresno, the original developers played a keen role in the street's design: "These trees, flowering acacias, camphor trees, and oleanders, the last alternating red, white and pink, will make the Page | 24 boulevard have an almost tropical appearance... [and] are in accordance with a plan formulated by Mr. (A.G.) Wishon, in order that the beauty of the thoroughfare will be insured" (Fresno Morning Republican 22 August 1910, in National Register nomination, 1994).

The Boulevard was planted with three primary trees: Cinnamomum camphora (Camphor Tree), Washingtonia robusta (Mexican Fan Palm) and Nerium oleander In subsequent years a few species were added including: (Oleander Trees). Liquidambar styracifilua (American Sweetgum), Magnolia grandiflora (Southern Magnolia), Lagerstroemia indica (Crape Myrtle), Pyrus callyriana 'Bradfordii' (Bradford Pear) and Cedrus atlantica glauca (Blue Atlas Cedar). Unlike other neighborhoods, the broad parkstrip has allowed the original street trees to survive with enough room for the roots and trunks to expand between the curb and sidewalks. After the streetcar tracks were abandoned in 1939, the median became a gracious lawn which gives the park-like character to the entire neighborhood (Personal communication Robert Boro 7 March 2015). Huntington Boulevard functions as an urban park and is used morning and evenings for recreational walking and biking.

Architects and Contractors

Charles E. Butner earned his degree under the Beaux-Arts architect Paul Cret at the University of Pennsylvania in 1911. Butner established a firm with a former classmate, Edward Glass in 1914 and the two architects worked together through the early 1920s Local buildings designed by Charles Butner include the Physicians Building (2607 Fresno Street, 1926) which is listed on both the National Register of Historic Places and Fresno's Local Register. Butner designed 3650 E. Huntington Blvd for Fred and Virginia Billings.

William D. Coates. William D. Coates also studied with Paul Cret at the University of Pennsylvania. From 1909 to 1911 Coates served as the California State Architect. He then entered private practice with a former college classmate H.B. Traver. In 1914 the firm moved to Fresno where they continued to practice until 1925. W.D. Coates was the architect for 3767 E. Huntington as well as his own French Eclectic style home at Page | 25 3901 E. Huntington. (The Coates lived across the street at 3904 E. Huntington while their home was under construction).

Felchlin, Shaw and Franklin are associated with the construction of most of the Classic Revival high rise buildings in Fresno's downtown from 1912 to 1930. Richard Ferdinand Felchlin was born in Stockton in 1888 and studied civil engineering at the University of California, Berkeley. He formed the R.F. Felchlin Company in Fresno in 1912 with Charles Franklin, engineer. In 1917 architect Raymond Shaw joined the team. The firm's projects included the Bank of Italy, the Patterson Building and the Radin and Kamp Building (Powell 1996). The firm is credited with the design and construction of the impressive 21/2 story Tudor style home for the Trowbridge family at 3560 E. Huntington.

Edward Glass was born in San Francisco in 1886 and moved to Fresno as a young child. He attended the University of California Berkeley and then studied architecture at the University of Pennsylvania under Paul Cret. Glass returned to Fresno and was soon joined by Charles Butner in 1914. Together they designed the Fresno Republican Printery Building. Glass and Butner are credited with the design of the first home to have a building permit on the Boulevard, The David and Neva Newman Home at 3611 E. Huntington. They also designed 3401 E. Huntington. Both homes are Italian Renaissance Revival in style.

H. Rafael Lake began his academic career at U.C. Berkeley and then transferred to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology from which he graduated in 1916. He apprenticed under Cass Gilbert in New York; Gilbert was the architect who designed the Woolworth Building, which in 1913 was the tallest building in the world. Lake moved to Fresno in 1923 and designed the Californian Hotel for the Sun Maid Hotel Corporation. In 1923 he joined the Trewhitt-Shields Company as the staff architect. The firm designed and built the Wilson Theatre (1926) and the L.C. Wesley Garage (1931). Lake designed two homes on Huntington Boulevard, the Ralph and Varina Merritt Home (3815 E. Huntington) and the Harry H and Mary Shields Home (3309 E. Huntington).

Fred Swartz attended University of Pennsylvania where he studied, as did so many other Fresno architects, under Paul Cret. Upon his return to Fresno he joined his

father's firm. Following the death in 1919 of A.C. Swartz, Fred Swartz formed a partnership with Columbus J. Ryland who had studied architecture at the University of Toulouse, France. Their local projects included the Fresno State College Library (now Fresno City College). During the Depression Swartz was a member of the Allied Architects and worked on the design of the Fresno County Hall of Records and the Page | 26 Fresno Memorial Auditorium (Powell 1996). Swartz lived at 3946 E. Huntington and is credited with the design of the Tudor home located at 4105 E. Huntington Boulevard.

Harrison B. Traver was another graduate of the University of Pennsylvania. He worked in the California State Architect's Office and in 1911 formed a partnership with W.D. Coates. They designed several local buildings and residences of note, including the Liberty Theatre and Fresno High School as well as the Wishon Home at 3555 E. Huntington Boulevard and the Colonial Revival style Butler Home, 3635 E. Huntington.

Walter Wagner was born in Berkeley in 1911 and graduated from UC in 1934, with a year of graduate studies in engineering at Harvard. He worked briefly for the National Park Service as an architect and organized the firm of Walter Wagner and Partners, Architects and Engineers in 1945, followed by Walter Wagner-Martin Temple in 1966. The firm's projects included Trinity Lutheran Church (1955); Fresno Police Headquarters (1960) and the Fresno County Courthouse (1966). Wagner apparently designed the residence located at 3850 E. Huntington which unfortunately has been significantly altered.

Contractors: Numerous contractors built the homes along the boulevard. Some of the best known are the following:

Fred Billings and Rhine Merering acquired the Alta Vista Tract in 1914, completed street development, completed the last of the municipal improvements and began to market the subdivision. The two men maintained their real estate partnership until 1935 at which time Billings joined forces with H.R. "Bud" Fine. During his long career Fred Billings helped to develop 82 subdivisions in the Fresno area including Kearney Boulevard Heights and the Mayfair District (Alta Vista Renaissance Populus 1991). Fred and Virginia Billings lived in several homes along the boulevard including 3238, 3638 and 3650 E. Huntington.

Fisher and McNulty. Hugh McNulty was born in St. Louis in 1892 and lived in Fresno from infancy. He graduated from Stanford University in Mining Engineering and formed a partnership with R.P. Fisher in 1920. The company constructed numerous buildings of note including the Pantages Theatre and Twining Laboratories, the latter designed by Charles Butner (Winchell, History of Fresno County). They constructed the Spanish Revival/Italian Renaissance home on 3702 E. Huntington.

Manoog Manoogian was born in Harput, Armenia in 1885 and settled in Fresno in Page | 27 1920. During his career as a home builder, he designed and constructed approximately 185 custom homes including the residence at 742 E. Home Avenue in the Wilson Island Historic District where he lived with his wife Arpine for 21 years. Manoogian was a skilled painter as well as a master cabinet maker. He is listed as the contractor for H.R. Fine's Home at 4119 E. Huntington. He died on December 24, 1975 at the age of 90.

Shore and Meads built the French Eclectic style home located at 3901 E. Huntington which was designed by its owner W. D Coates.

Taylor-Wheeler Builders was a design and construction firm that built homes throughout the San Joaquin Valley. Today the firm's name still has caché and value due to the quality of construction. The company was founded in 1927 by Orville R. Taylor and Dennis Wheeler. Taylor was a draughtsman who designed most of the firm's early homes; Wheeler attended both Stanford and Cal and graduated with a degree in Commerce. He managed the company's business and supervised construction and built a Tudor style cottage for himself in 1927. In 1936 Allen C. Collins was hired to serve as the firm's architect (Powell 1996). The firm built the "guest house" located at 3406 E. Huntington; (3345; 3465 E. Huntington; see list from spreadsheet of T-W projects; 4056 E. Huntington, 4123 E. Huntington; also the altered 3429 E. Huntington Boulevard, a non-contributor.

Trewhitt-Shields and Fisher were the contractors for two homes for their own staff 3309 E. Huntington for H.H. Shields and 4151 for Robert Fisher. They are also on the building permits for 3815 E. Huntington, 3146 E. Huntington, 3420 and 3916 E. Huntington Boulevard.

Findings and Conclusions

The 121 residential properties were evaluated for their potential as contributors to the proposed Local Register Historic District with a period of significance of 1914-1977. Of the 121 properties, five were found to have lost integrity due to inappropriate alterations. The City's Historic Preservation Ordinance does NOT require that all properties within a Local District be at least 50 years of age; rather pursuant to FMC 12-1607 "at least fifty percent of the resources within the proposed Local Historic District" should be fifty years or older. This provision (in contrast to the norms for individual designation) allowed the period of significance to extend to the most recent in-fill property on the boulevard, a 1977 contemporary style residence.

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Any finite group of resources may be designated as a Local Historic District if it meets the definition set forth in FMC 12-1603(s):

"...resources related to one another in a clearly distinguishable way or any geographically definable area which possesses a significant concentration, linkage or continuity of sites, buildings, structures or objects united historically or aesthetically by plan or physical development. The Local Historic District must be significant as well as identifiable and it must meet Local Register Criteria for listing on that Register."

Additionally, the City's Historic Preservation Commission and Council must find that the District meets one or more of the following criteria:

- It exemplifies or reflects special elements of the city's cultural, social, economic, political, aesthetic, engineering, or architectural heritage, or
- It is identified with a person or group that contributed significantly to the culture and development of the city, or
- It embodies distinctive characteristics of a style, type, period or method of construction, or is a valuable example of the use of indigenous materials or craftsmanship, or
- Structures within the area exemplify a particular architectural style or way of life important to the city, or
- The area is related to a designated historic resource or district in such a way that its preservation is essential to the integrity of the designated resource or Local Historic District, or

6) The area has potential for yielding information of archaeological interest.

At the January 26, 2009 meeting of the Historic Preservation Commission, staff presented the following statement of significance for the proposed District:

The District appears to meet the Designation Criteria of Section 12-1607(b) of the Page | 29 Ordinance under Criteria 1), 2) and 4). Huntington Boulevard was the first subdivision on the eastern edge of Fresno's parent grid and was platted in 1911 as a street car suburb as part of the Alta Vista Tract. The Sunnyside-S.P. Depot line ran down the middle of the boulevard beginning in 1907 and was a component of the street car system that was financed by Henry E. Huntington, for whom the new boulevard was named (criterion 1). By the 1920s the boulevard was the address of many of the City's leading professionals, including Albert Wishon (Criterion 2). Huntington Boulevard is an eclectic mix of architectural styles that were popular from 1911 through the 1960s, including Craftsman bungalows and period revival buildings. Of interest as well is the economic mix of buildings from upscale mansions to more modest residences for the middle class and even working class (Criterion 4). Huntington Boulevard is one of the few Fresno neighborhoods that is included in A Field Guide to America's Historic Neighborhoods and Museum Houses: The Western States by Virginia and Lee McAlester.

Local Historic Districts include two criteria that reflect architectural significance. It seems appropriate to add Criterion 3 as well as Criterion 4 for significance. Other than this addition and the somewhat later period of significance of 1914-1977, staff opinion is that the information presented to and approved by the Commission in Phase 1 of the District nomination process is correct. Thus Huntington Boulevard appears to be eligible as a Local Historic District under Criteria 1, 2, 3 and 4.

Conservation Plan:

The process for designating a District is further discussed at 12-1610 of the Fresno Municipal Code. Following the designation of a Local District by the City Council the applicant shall have 90 days to develop a Conservation/District Plan "which will set forth the manner in which the preservation objectives of the Local Historic District will be met." Staff prepared a draft plan and submitted it to an ad hoc group of Huntington Boulevard Historic District property owners who revised it to meet their specific needs. On August 13, 2015 a neighborhood meeting was held and the Plan was endorsed by all the property owners in attendance.

Preservation Concerns:

Window Replacement: A significant loss of integrity to a historic property occurs when property owners replace their original wood or steel sash windows with vinyl, hoping to save energy and thus money over time. Studies conducted by the City of Page | 30 Fresno, PGE and other groups across the country indicate that most heat loss and gain is through the attic, through inadequate insulation and faulty ducting, through cracks around doors and windows. Heavy drapes, shutters, storm windows and awnings are traditional and less expensive methods to save energy.

Project Staff Qualifications

Karana Hattersley-Drayton has a M.A. and completed three years of coursework towards the Ph.D. in Architectural History at U.C. Berkeley. For three years she served on the State Historical Resources Commission and has also served on the Board of Page | 31 Directors for the Vernacular Architecture Forum. She was the Chair for the VAF's annual conference which met in Fresno in May 2008. Ms. Hattersley-Drayton moved to Fresno in 1999 to work as an architectural historian for Caltrans District 06 and in June of 2002 was hired as the City of Fresno's Historic Preservation Project Manager. She chairs the Development and Resource Management Department's Fresno Green Team and is also the chair for the Public Art Committee. She has taught courses in California architecture and American urbanism at Sonoma State University and most recently for the OSHER Institute at Fresno State University. Areas of particular interest include the vernacular, gendered and ethnic landscapes of the San Joaquin Valley, sustainability and preservation. The publication, Architecture, Ethnicity and Historic Landscapes of the San Joaquin Valley, for which she wrote several articles and served as Executive Editor, won a 2008 California Preservation Foundation and a 2009 Governor's Historic Preservation award.

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
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
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

*Resource Name: Huntington Boulevard Historic District

*D3. Detailed Description: The Huntington Boulevard Historic District includes 121 residential properties (116 contributors) located on both sides of the grassy median that once served as the streetcar corridor. This boulevard is located within the Alta Vista Tract which was officially platted in 1911 and annexed to the City on January 23, 1912. The tract extended from First Street on the west to Twelfth Street (now Cedar Avenue) on the east, the north side of Balch Avenue and the south side of Platt Avenue east of Fifth Street and both sides of Platt Avenue to Twelfth Street. Residential parcels on the south side of Verrue Avenue were also included from Sixth to Twelfth (Alta Vista Tract Map Amended). Homes on the boulevard date from 1914 to 1977 and represent some of the finest examples of Craftsman and Period Revival architecture in the City. In addition, many of Fresno's influential families with important ties to banking, education, architecture and commerce have lived on the street. The neighborhood has been *called out" as an area of architectural interest in Virginia and Lee McAlester's A Field Guide to America's Historic Neighborhoods and Museum Houses: The Western States (1998:45-47). Eleven homes are individually listed on the Local Register of Historic Resources with one additional home a Heritage Property (For the list of resources, see attached continuation sheets and individual primary records).

*D4. Boundary Description: The proposed boundary includes all residences, public spaces (including the median) and landscape features that front onto Huntington Boulevard, beginning at First Street on the west and ending at Cedar Avenue on the east (see map as attached).

*D5. Boundary Justification: The District boundaries are concurrent with the residential buildings and landscape features on both sides of the former streetcar corridor and main street of the Alta Vista Tract.

*D6. Significance: Theme: Early 20th Century Residential Expansion, Street Car Suburbs Area: Huntington Boulevard (Alta Vista Tract) Period of Significance: 1914-1977 Applicable Criteria: Local Register District i, ii, iii and iv.

Huntington Boulevard is one of the most architecturally distinct neighborhoods in Fresno with a diverse mix representing the major styles prevalent during the period (1914-1977). Several homes were designed by prominent local and regional architects (and/or design-build firms) including Butner and Glass, Coates and Traver, Felchlin, Franklin and Shaw, H. Rafael Lake, Fred Swartz and Taylor-Wheeler Builders. W.D. Coates (who served as the California State Architect from 1909-1911) designed the only French Eclectic style residence on the boulevard as his home. Henry Shields, a partner in the design-build firm of Trewhitt-Shields and Fisher, also had a home built for him on the boulevard. Shortly after its annexation in 1912 Huntington Boulevard became the preferred address for the intellectual and business elite of Fresno. Property owners included A.G. Wishon; Fred Billings, who with his business partner Rhine Meyering developed the Alta Vista Tract; Fresno Bee editor Carlos McClatchy; the President of Gottschalks Department Store (Abraham Blum); and numerous attorneys, teachers, physicians, ranchers and local business owners.

The District appears to be eligible for Fresno's Local Register of Historic Resources pursuant to FMC 12-1607(b) under Criteria i, ii, iii and iv. The District also appears to be eligible to the National Register of Historic Places although separate forms will be required for this nomination.

Block 1, Map Reference #001: The John and Bertha Garabedian Home, 3104 E. Huntington Boulevard: This single story Ranch style home was constructed in 1953 by contractor J.T. Cowan. John Garabedian was a rancher who owned acreage in Madera, Fresno and Riverside Counties. He patented several varieties of stone fruit and was a partner in Peters and Garabedian Fruit Packing Co. He was appointed by Governor Ronald Reagan to the State Board of Agriculture in the 1960s.

#002: The Elmer and Neva Lord Home, 3120 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Craftsman bungalow was built in 1919 by C.V. Smith. Elmer Lord was President/Manager of Fisher Glassford Hardware Company which was established in 1903. Mr. Lord was prominent in Fresno's civic affairs.

#003: The Joseph and Clara Lord Home, 3130 E. Huntington. The Lords were the parents of the next door neighbor, Elmer Lord, and had this Craftsman bungalow built in 1919.

#004: The Frank Giannini Home, 3136 E. Huntington Boulevard. (Non-contributor). A building permit was first issued for this home in 1917. Unfortunately it has been significantly altered over the years and is not a contributor to the historic district.

#005: The Oscar Roy and Maude West Home, 3146 E. Huntington Boulevard. This one story Minimal Traditional style home was constructed in 1936 by Trewitt-Shields and Fisher. O.R. West was a division engineer for the Santa Fe Railway here in Fresno.

#006: The Helen May Wienke Home, 3154 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Tudor Revival style home was constructed in 1938 by contractors Walker and Walker, who are also listed on the original building permit as the owners of the parcel. Helen May Wienke owned and resided in the home from 1938-1951 and also from 1960-1987. Ms. Wienke was the Principal at several local elementary schools and in 1959 became an assistant professor at the University of the Pacific.

#007: The Charles and Sarah Hood Home, 3166 E. Huntington Boulevard. The first property owners for this parcel were the Fresno Home Builders, who pulled the construction permit on May 22, 1930. According to research prepared by the Huntington Boulevard Homeowners Association, Charles and Sarah Hood were the first residents of this one-story Tudor home in 1938, although they quickly sold it in 1939. Charles Hood was a civil engineer and was appointed Postmaster by President Roosevelt in 1934.

#008: The H.C.and Lena Wienke Home, 3210 E. Huntington Boulevard. This 1922 home is among the few Prairie style residences on the block. The first owners, H.C. and Lena Wienke, were one of three Wienke families who lived on Huntington Boulevard. H.C. Wienke was a retired director of Vocational Education at Fresno Technical School.

#009: The George and Anne Reed Home, 3220 E Huntington Boulevard. No original building permit is on file for this Airplane Bungalow although a major alteration occurred in 1927. The County Assessor has assigned a construction date of 1924. Huntington Boulevard Homeowners Association notes that the first property owners, George and Anne Reed, lived in the residence from 1920-1927.

#010: The G.L. and Frances Moore Home, 3228 E. Huntington Boulevard. This two-story home reflects Craftsman aesthetics but is a bit of an anomaly. A building permit was issued to contractors Dan Blosser on October 24, 1919. The porch was enclosed in 1949. The Moores lived in the home for 25 years.

Block 1 continued:

#011: The Fred and Virginia Billings Home, 3238 E. Huntington Boulevard. This full 2-story Arts and Crafts style home was one of several residences along Huntington owned by the developer Fred Billings. In 1914 Billings and his business partner Rhine Meyering acquired the Alta Vista Tract, completed the infrastructure and began to market the subdivision. A building permit for this property was issued to Alta Vista Homes Company on April 20, 1918. Billings partner in real estate from 1935 on was H.R. Fine. Fine and his wife Mildred also lived in the home in later years.

#012: The James and Anzanetta Erskine Home, 3248 E. Huntington Boulevard. James and Anzanetta Erskine were the original owners of this residence which was constructed in 1922. James Erksine was manager of the Central Ice Company and later had an interest in the Calwa Water Works. Mrs. Erskine (aka Jessie Miller) was a professional musician who performed in both the United States and abroad.

#013: The Lena Antitich Home, 3264 E. Huntington Boulevard. A building permit valued at \$7,650 was issued to contractor R. Pederson and Son on November 13, 1939 and a Certificate of Completion was issued on 6 April 1940.

Block 2, Map Reference #014: The Dr. Adam Konigmacher Home, 3300 E. Huntington Boulevard. This one story Tudor home was constructed in 1936 by the contractor J.D. Shorb. Dr. Adam Koinmacher was a well-known local physician who served on the City Health Board for 16 years.

#015: The Anna Kahn Home, 3318 E. Huntington Boulevard. This very distinct 1922 home has a varied pedigree with stylistic influences from both Neoclassical as well as Italian Renaissance. At least two other homes in the Tower District neighborhood share an affinity with this house and may have been designed by the same firm or architect. The home is one of several on Huntington Boulevard featured in the publication, A Field Guide to America's Historic Neighborhoods (p. 46). Mrs. Anna Kahn is listed as the owner on the original 1922 building permit.

#016: The Leland Frenzel Home, 3326 E. Huntington Boulevard. (Non-contributor). This one-story residence was constructed in 1939 by contractor T.W. Howard. It has been modernized to the point that it has lost its integrity to its period of significance and is therefore a non-contributor to the Huntington Boulevard Historic District.

#017: The A.M. King Home, 3338 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Craftsman bungalow was constructed in 1919 apparently for A.M. King whose name appears on the original building permit. A 1954 addition was constructed by Fisher and McNulty.

#018: The Jesse and Zella Rodman Home, 3348 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Spanish Revival style home was the residence of Jesse and Zella Rodman from 1929 (the year of construction) to 1940. Jesse Rodman was the owner of Rodman Chevrolet Distributorship. He also owned two radio stations, KFRE in Fresno and KERO in Bakersfield. The Rodmans subdivided their ranch property on the east side of Fresno and the area became known as Sunnyside.

#019: The A.J. and Mattie Rudy Home, 3358 E. Huntington Boulevard. Apparently this two-story home was initially a Colonial Revival style residence when it was constructed in 1920. It is unclear when the alterations to the façade entrance were made. All façade windows have been changed out.

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Block 3, Map Reference #020: The B. B. Turner Home and guest house, 3406 E. Huntington Boulevard. This stately Neoclassical home was built in 1938. The 2-story guest house, also with a portico entrance, was constructed at the rear of the parcel and attached to the garage in 1950 by Taylor-Wheeler Builders. This home is also featured in the publication, A Field Guide to America's Historic Neighborhoods. The residence was later the home of a J.E. O'Neill who apparently entertained widely, including President J.F. Kennedy.

#021: The Dudley Carlsen Home, 3420 E. Huntington Boulevard. Trewhitt-Shields and Fisher constructed this contemporary home in 1936. The original owner, Dudley Carlson, was the manager and vice president of Borden Dairy Delivery Company. He was a founding member of the Bulldog Foundation.

#022: The Clarence and Bessie Bernhauer Home, 3428 E. Huntington Boulevard (HP#287). This Italian Renaissance style home was built in 1919 and sits on a .5 acre parcel, which previously included private tennis courts. Clarence Bernhauer was the Vice President of the Fresno Planing Mill. The home was designated individually to the Local Register of Historic Resources on September 25, 2014. Additional historical information can be found on the survey forms for this property.

#023: The Le Roy St. John Home, 3448 E. Huntington Boulevard. This one-story Craftsman bungalow was constructed in 1921 by contractor S.L. Allen. Alterations occurred in 1950---perhaps the rock veneer to facade and base of the porch piers. Le Roy St. John was a restaurant operator.

#024: The Florence Folsom Home, 3462 E. Huntington Boulevard. Walker and Walker were the contractors for the 1941 Spanish Revival style home. Florence Folsom was the first owner and resided in the residence from 1941-1952, after which other members of her family continued to own and live here. This home is included in the publication, A Guide to America's Historic Neighborhoods.

Block 4, Map Reference #25: The J.B. and Maria Cella Home, 3504 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Italian Renaissance home was completed in 1939 and commands the .34 acre parcel on the southeast corner of E. Huntington and Fifth Street. The design is attributed to San Francisco architect, Louis Franceschi, and the property owner, J.B. Cella, is listed as the contractor on the building permit(s). J.B. Cella emigrated from Piacenza, Italy in 1898 and was influential in the American wine industry. Cella owned the Roma Wine Company in Fresno (and other wineries as well) and was the director and vice president of Schenly Distillers Corporation.

#026: The Peter and Evelyn Loinaz Home, 3528 E. Huntington Boulevard. Peter and Evelyn Loinaz were the original owners of this 1919 Prairie/Italian Renaissance Revival home. Loinaz was a Fresno County rancher and wholesale liquor dealer. The contractor listed on the building permit is W.H. Ackerman.

#027: The Edward and Myrtle Granz Home, 3530 E. Huntington Boulevard. This 1931 Tudor Revival home easily disappears behind a facade of English ivy. The roof is slate. Original owners with Edward and Myrtle Granz; Edward Granz was a local rancher and insurance agent.

#028: The Dr. Dwight and Margaret Trowbridge Home, 3560 E. Huntington Boulevard. impressive 21/2 story Tudor Revival style home is attributed to the design-build firm of Felchlin, Shaw and Franklin (see context section on architects). It was constructed in 1925 for Dr. Dwight and Margaret Trowbridge. Dr. Trowbridge was a physician and surgeon and also owned ranch property. Margaret Trowbridge was a schoolteacher and active in community affairs.

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Block 5, Map Reference #029: The Aaron and Selma Maisler Home, 3606 E. Huntington Boulevard. The first residents of this 1939 Spanish Revival home were in the lumber business and lived on the property for 44 years. The home appears to have been built on speculation as the original owner is the contractor on the building permit(s), A.G. Lampases.

#030: The Erle and Bertha Gearhart Home, 3618 E. Huntington Boulevard. This 1½ story Tudor Revival cottage has a two story side gabled rear addition and was built in 1925. Erle and Bertha Gearhart were part owners of the firm, Gearhart and Scheuler Radio Manufacturers.

#031: The William and Bess Blayney Home, 3626 E. Huntington Boulevard. William Blayney was a display manager for Gottschalks Department Store, a professional musician as well and treasurer of the Fresno Musicians Union. This Italian Renaissance style home was constructed in 1923. A room and bath were added in 1941 by Fisher and McNulty.

#032: The F.B. and Virginia Billings Home, 3638 E. Huntington Boulevard. This very distinctive 1919 Arts and Crafts style home is one of five Huntington Boulevard properties owned by the Billings family. Fred Billings was a native of Marshalltown, Iowa and came to Fresno in September 1910. He went into real estate with Rhine Meyering (aka Billings and Meyering). In 1914 the partnership acquired the Alta Vista Tract, completed the infrastructure and began to market the subdivision in earnest. The Billings lived in this home from 1920-1939.

#033: The Fred and Virginia Billings Home, 3650 E. Huntington Boulevard (HP# 289). Apparently the Billings family moved one parcel east in 1939 following the completion of this Colonial Revival home in 1938. The building is attributed to architect Charles E. Butner (see historic context section on architects). The home was designated as an individual resource on the Local Register of Historic Resources by the Fresno City Council on September 25, 2014.

Block 6, Map Reference #034: The F. Rex and Vera Sporleder Home, 3702 E. Huntington Boulevard (HP#288). This home claims stylistic influences from both the Spanish Eclectic as well as the asymmetrical sub-type of the Italian Renaissance Revival. It was constructed in 1926 by the contracting firm of Fisher and McNulty. The home includes an extant second story sleeping porch on the rear elevation. F. Rex Sporleder was by 1950 the sole owner of the Hollenbeck-Bush Planing Mill in Fresno.

#035: The Oran and Rhoda Davis Home, 3720 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Craftsman bungalow was constructed in 1919, at a time when numerous other bungalows were built on Huntington Boulevard. Of interest is that a building permit for a sleeping porch was issued in 1934. The first residents were Oran and Rhoda Davis. Oran Davis was in real estate and insurance.

#036: The Edward and Rose Casner Home, 3728 E. Huntington Boulevard. No original building permit is on file in the City of Fresno but Huntington Homeowners' Association research on the property states that Alta Vista Homes constructed this Prairie style home in 1919-1920. Alta Vista Homes was the business entity of developers Fred Billings and Rhine Meyering. The Casners owned the Casner Drug Store chain and they lived in this home for 43 years.

#037: The Lester and Cecil Heitzig Home, 3738 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Minimal Traditional style home was constructed in 1938 by contractor J.T. Cowan. The Heitzig family lived here for 30 years.

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#038: The Phillips Home, 3748 E. Huntington Boulevard. Contractor C.E. Buckmaster constructed this distinct Craftsman bungalow in 1922. Harris Construction built an addition in 1938.

#039: The Dr. A.F. and Nellie Howard Home, 3758 E. Huntington Boulevard. This altered bungalow was originally constructed in 1920.

Block 7, Map Reference #040: The Dr. Elmer and Minnie Smith Home, 3802 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Spanish Eclectic style home was built in 1931 in a rambling plan around a courtyard garden. Dr. Schmidt moved to Fresno in 1921 and was the first Board Certified Obstetrician-Gynecologist in Fresno County.

#041: The Ira Homer and Eleanor Rowell Home, 3828 E. Huntington Boulevard. Ira Rowell was the nephew of Dr. Chester Rowell, the editor and publisher of the Fresno Morning Republican. Ira Rowell served as the advertising manager of the newspaper and eventually moved to San Francisco to practice law. This Tudor Revival Home was constructed in 1919, although no original building permit exists, only a permit noting alterations in 1919.

#042: The Lesley and Ruth Einstein Home, 3850 E. Huntington Boulevard. This ranch style home was apparently designed by Walter Wagner and constructed by contractor/builder J.T. Cowan in 1950. Unfortunately it has been altered by the change-out of original windows for vinyl sliders. The first residents were descendants of early Fresno families: Lesley Einstein was the son of Louis Einstein, Fresno's first Postmaster and Wells Fargo agent. The land for Einstein Playground was donated by Lesley Einstein's mother. Mr. Einstein farmed in the Reedley area and was an original director of Fresno State College. He had numerous other civic duties and connections (see property file in City's historic preservation archives).

#043: The Abraham Blum Residence, 3870 E. Huntington Boulevard (HP#198). This rambling Spanish Eclectic style home includes an enclosed garden courtyard and fountain. It was constructed in 1927 for Abe and Mildred Blum who apparently patterned the design of the home after ones they had admired in Pasadena. Blum was the President of the Department store, Gottschalks.

Block 8, Map Reference #044: The Coates-Paul Home, 3904 E. Huntington Boulevard. This 1923 Tudor Revival home was designed by architect W.D. Coates. From 1909 to 1911 Coates served as the California State Architect. He then entered private practice with H.B. Traver. In 1914 the firm moved to Fresno where they continued to practice until 1925. He and his wife only lived in the home for two years while their home across the street at 3901 was being constructed. The second family, Albert and Julie Paul lived in this residence for 18 years. Albert Paul was the principle owner and manager of the California Products Company which he purchased in 1929.

#045: The Andrew and Pearl Graham Home, 3916 E. Huntington Boulevard. No original building permit exists for this property but the construction date assigned by the Assessor (and Huntington Boulevard researchers) is 1949. The home has Colonial Revival detailing and is attributed to Trewhitt-Shields and Fisher. Andrew Graham worked for the design build firm as an estimator and was a contractor as well.

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Block 8, Map Reference #046: The Otto and Maude Baty Home, 3924 E. Huntington Boulevard.

A building permit was issued for this Craftsman bungalow in 1922. The odd "overhang" on the façade was added in 1935. The Baty family lived at this address for 13 years.

#047: The Henry and Doris Lathy Home, 3940 E. Huntington Boulevard. This one-story Tudor Revival home was built in 1931. Henry K. Lathy Jr. was a rancher.

#048: The Dan and Mary Chamberlain Home, 3946 E. Huntington Boulevard. Dan Chamberlain was an engineer who prior to coming to Fresno worked on dams on the Mississippi River. He was an avid photographer and often hosted parties to share travel photos in the basement of this home. Following his death, Mary Chamberlain married architect Fred Swartz who during the Depression was a member of the Allied Architects and worked on the design of the Fresno County Hall of Records and the Fresno Memorial Auditorium. This stucco-clad Tudor Revival home was constructed in 1931.

#049: The Peter and Aznive Hanonian Home, 3966 E. Huntington Boulevard. The Ranch style home was constructed apparently on speculation by contractor J.W. Bruce in 1945. Of interest is that the City's building department did NOT approve the "tile" used in the home. Whether this reference is to the tile roof or most likely to the walls, which on the permit were also noted as being tile, is unknown. However the walls are apparently constructed of pumitile, hollow masonry units made of cement and pumice pebbles from volcanic deposits along the San Joaquin River. The first residents were Peter and Aznive Hanoian. Peter Hanoian was the son of the founder of the Hanoian Market.

Block 9, Map Reference #050: The Louie and Stella Siakovich Home, 4010 E. Huntington Boulevard. This one story Spanish Eclectic style home was constructed in 1949 by contractors Yager and Yager.

#051: The Henry and Katherine Rosenthal Home, 4018 E. Huntington Boulevard. This 2-story Colonial Revival home was owned and constructed by Henry Rosenthal in 1937.

#052: The William and Ella Washburn Home, 4024 E. Huntington Boulevard. Harris Construction Company built this one-story Colonial style home in 1940 for William and Ella Washburn. J.B. and Madeline Perenchio purchased the home from the Washburns in 1944. Perenchio was a contractor and in 1952 was issued a permit for a 20x20 addition to the rear of the garage.

#053: The C.E. and Ruth Appling Home, 4038 E. Huntington Boulevard. C.E. Sisler is the contractor on the 1926 building permit for this Craftsman bungalow.

#054: The Electro and Margaret Maselli Home, 4042 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Minimal Traditional style home was built in 1941 by contractor Leo F. Jarvis. Elector Maselli was a co-owner with his father and brothers in the Maselli Winery.

#055: The Dr. Daniel and Merle Aller Home, 4056 E. Huntington Boulevard. This ranch/Minimal Traditional style home was constructed by Taylor-Wheeler Builders in 1941. Prior to World War II, Dr. Aller was the company doctor for the Yosemite Lumber Company at Merced Falls. His wife, Merle, was a registered nurse and anesthesiologist for the Company during Dr. Aller's service. When the Allers moved to Fresno Dr. Aller specialized in orthopedics.

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Block 10, Map Reference #056: The George and Esther Lips Home, 4104 E. Huntington Boulevard.

This charming Minimal Traditional style home wraps the southeast corner of Eleventh Street and E. Huntington Boulevard. It was constructed in 1937 for George and Esther Lips.

#057: The Howard and Ada Richards Home, 4114 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Minimal Traditional style home was completed in time for Christmas in 1940, with a certificate of occupancy dated 16 December 1940.

#058: The K.K. and Alma Fifer Home, 4122 E. Huntington Boulevard. Walker and Walker Contractors built this Ranch style home in 1949. Apparently the house has an enclosed courtyard.

#059: The Harry and Evelyn Thuessen Home, 4136 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Minimal Traditional style home was constructed in 1936 by C.V. Smith.

#060: The Louis Zlokevich Home, 4142 E. Huntington Boulevard. The first property owner of this distinctive Tudor is a tad unclear: the building permit issued in 1931 notes an R.P. Moore as owner; the Huntington Boulevard Association notes that it was the residence of Louis Zlokevich.

#061: The K.M. and Jane Mitchell Home, 4156 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Minimal Traditional style home was completed on 1 February 1937. G.C. Walker was the contractor on the record.

#062: The Jesse and Nancy Quinn Home, 4168 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Craftsman cottage was constructed on the southwest corner of E Huntington and Cedar in 1923. A 10x20 foot addition was built in 1930. Another 6x6' addition was permitted in 1947 as well as a 10x20 foot addition to the garage. A swimming pool was constructed on the parcel in 1956.

Block 11, Map Reference #063: The J.W. and Freda Bruce Home, 4161 E. Huntington Boulevard. The principle character-defining feature of this single-story Mission Revival style home is the roof parapet over the south facing façade window. A certificate of completion was issued in 1936 to contractors Walker and Walker.

#064: The Robert and Mary Fisher Home, 4151 E. Huntington Boulevard. Robert Fisher of Trewhitt-Shields and Fisher designed this Spanish Eclectic style home which was ready for occupancy in February 1939.

#065: The Walter and Marjorie Johnson Home, 4145 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Minimal Traditional style home has modest Spanish Revival detailing. It was probably built in 1937 as a speculator home by the contractor Frank Jackson (who is listed as the original owner). However, the first residents were the Johnsons. Mr. Johnson was the local Hudson Automobile dealer and was the commanding officer of the Civil Air Patrol at Chandler Field in 1948.

#066: The Roy and Margaret Hall Home, 4135 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Tudor Revival 2 ½ story home has some unusual features, including the very stout columns which support the steeply pitched porch roof. The house was constructed in 1920 by the Fresno Building Corporation who continued to own the parcel in 1922 when a permit was issued for a garage. Roy Hall was the manager for the Inland Iron Works.

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#067: The John and Virginia Carter Home, 4123 E. Huntington Boulevard. Taylor-Wheeler, Inc. owned the parcel and constructed this Minimal Traditional style home in 1936. John Carter owned Carter's Dairy in Selma.

#068: The H.R. and Mildred Fine Home, 4119 E. Huntington Boulevard. This one story Tudor cottage was built by H.R. Fine as his family residence. The contractor on the Certificate of Completion in 1936 was M. Manoogian. Manoogian was born in Harput, Armenia in 1885 and settled in Fresno in 1920. During his career as a home builder, he designed and constructed approximately 185 custom homes.

#069: Paul and Elinor Ashley Home, 4105 E. Huntington Boulevard. This distinct 1½ story Tudor Revival home is attributed to architect, Fred Swartz. The contractor on the home was A.E. Clifford and the Certificate of Completion was issued to the owner, Paul Ashley in 1936. Ashley was the general manager of the Central California Ice Company, Fresno Consumers Ice Company and Valley Ice Company, which were located on P Street near to the current Fresno City Hall. Elinor Ashley served in the U.S. Army Nursing Corps in France during World War I.

Block 12, Map reference #070: The Edward and Emma Kellas Home, 4057 E. Huntington Boulevard. This full 2-story (with attic) Arts and Crafts style home commands the northwest corner of E. Huntington Boulevard and Eleventh Street. The house and garage were constructed by the Fresno Building Corporation in 1920. Edward Kellas began his law practice in Fresno in 1919 and was appointed as a judge by Governor Earl Warren in 1949.

#071: The O.D. and Ida Rae Atkins Home, 4047 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Craftsman bungalow was constructed in 1922 by the owner, builder O.D. Atkins, who constructed several homes in the Alta Vista Tract including 4017 E. Huntington Boulevard.

#072: The W.E. and Ethel Simpson Home, 4035 E. Huntington Boulevard. This nice Craftsman bungalow was constructed during a "hey-day" for the style on the boulevard. Contractor S. L. Allen pulled the building permit in 1921. William Simpson was an attorney and Deputy District Attorney for the County of Los Angeles.

#073: The V.M. and Edith Gregory Home, 4025 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Craftsman bungalow was built in 1925.

#074: The Hans and Anna Beck Home, 4017 E. Huntington Boulevard. O.D. Atkins was the contractor for this 1921 bungalow.

#075: The G. G. and Margaret Dervishian Home, 4007 E. Huntington Boulevard. This contemporary Ranch style home was completed in 1953; the owner G.G. Dervishian served as the contractor.

Block 13, Map Reference #076: The Eugene and Elsie Brinker Home, 3965 E. Huntington Boulevard (HP#290). This charming Tudor Revival cottage was constructed in 1930. Character-defining features of the residence include the hexagonal bay window and decorative strapwork. William Eugene Brinker co-owned the French Furniture Company with his mother. He and his mother also constructed at least two bungalow courts in the Tower District. The property was designated to the Local Register in 2014.

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#077: The J.A. and Leila Reilley Home, 3943 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Minimal Traditional style home was built in 1941. J.A. Reilley worked for the Santa Fe Railroad.

#078: The W.M. and Neva Dustan Home, 3937 E. Huntington Boulevard. The original owners of this Craftsman bungalow came to Fresno from Canada. William Dustan was president of the Rose Society. The home was built in 1921 by Yarnell and Garges and a permit was issued to the same firm a year earlier for a garage on the parcel.

#079: The D.A. Shope Home, 3927 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Craftsman bungalow was also built by the contracting firm of Yarnell and Garges in 1921 and is one of many bungalows along the north side of Huntington constructed during this time period.

#080: The Clayton and Emily Chandler Home, 3917 E. Huntington Boulevard. This 1919 Craftsman bungalow is similar to the two homes adjacent to it to the east. T.H. and Alvina Curry were the first owners but they sold the home immediately to the Chandlers who lived here for 16 years. Clayton was a farmer and the Director of Sun Maid Raisin Growers. His father was State Senator W.F. Chandler who donated the acreage on which Chandler Field Airport was constructed.

#081: The W.D. Coates Home, 3901 E. Huntington Boulevard. This home is known on the boulevard as the "Witches House." This French Eclectic style home is identified through its character-defining feature of the round tower with conical roof which serves as the principle entrance. The residence was completed in 1928 and was designed by the owner, architect W.D. Coates. The contractors were Shorb and Meads. From 1909 to 1911 Coates served as the California State Architect. He then entered private practice with H.B. Traver. In 1914 the firm moved to Fresno where they continued to practice until 1925.

Block 14, Map Reference #082: The Daniel and Esther Diel Home, 3869 E. Huntington Boulevard. This ranch home wraps around the northwest corner of Ninth Street and E. Huntington Boulevard on a .34 acre parcel. It was completed in 1953 by contractors Ericson and House. Daniel Diel owned a grocery store and was a beer distributor. His parents were Germans from Russia pioneers who immigrated to the Fresno area.

#083: The Harold and Jeanette Lewis Home, 3839 E. Huntington Boulevard. C.V. Smith built this Colonial Revival home in 1939. Jeanette (Maxfield) Lewis was a widely acclaimed painter whose art work has been shown throughout the United States. The home itself is featured in A Field Guide to American's Historic Neighborhoods (p. 47).

#084: The Harold and Elizabeth Manselian Home, 3821 E. Huntington Boulevard. This contemporary style residence was designed and constructed by the owners in 1971-2 of Hans Sumpf adobe bricks. Harold Manselian owned Farmer's Lumber and Supply Company. The home has high integrity to its period of significance and although less than 50 years of age is a contributor to the historic district.

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#085: The Ralph and Varina Merritt Home, 3815 E. Huntington. Architect H. Raphael Lake and builders, Trewhitt-Shields designed and constructed this unique Colonial Revival home. Lake moved to Fresno in 1923 and designed the Californian Hotel for the Sun Maid Hotel Corporation. The 1926 residence was built for the Merritt family. Ralph Merritt was president and managing director of Sun Maid Raisin Company.

Block 15, Map Reference #086: The Floyd and Molly Harkness Home, 3767 E. Huntington Boulevard. This 1939 home was designed by W.D. Coates and constructed by Roy Martin. From 1909 to 1911 Coates served as the California State Architect. He then entered private practice with H.B. Traver and in 1914 the firm moved to Fresno where they continued to practice until 1925. By 1939 Floyd Harkness was the manager and owner of the United Packing Company, one of the largest fruit packing companies in the San Joaquin Valley. He was the director of the California Tree Fruit and Grape Associations as well as the Muscat Cooperative Wine Association. Molly Harkness graduated in the first class from Fresno Normal School (1913) and thereafter taught in several county schools.

#087: The Don and Caroline Makey Home, 3747 E. Huntington Boulevard. This 1977 contemporary home was constructed on the portion of the parcel that included the pool and rose garden for the adjacent Bekins-McClatchy Home (3729 E. Huntington Boulevard). Although the residence is less than 50 years of age it has integrity to its period of significance and is considered a contributor to the District,

#088: The Bekins-McClatchy Home, 3729 E. Huntington Boulevard (HP#282). Two families of importance in Fresno history are associated with this striking 1926 Tudor Revival style home. The first property owner was Floyd Bekins of Bekins Van and Storage. In 1930 the home was sold to Carlos and Phebe McClatchy. Carlos McClatchy was the son of C.K. McClatchy who with his brother owned the Sacramento Bee. When the McClatchys looked to Fresno to expand their newspaper empire they sent Carlos, who had served as an Associate Editor in Sacramento. The first issue of the Fresno Bee was published on October 17, 1922 with Carlos McClatchy as Editor.

#089: The C.M. and Gertrude Prescott Home, 3707 E. Huntington Boulevard (HP#285). This stately Tudor Revival style home is located on a half-acre parcel. In was constructed in 1921 for C.M. "Ned" and Gertrude Prescott who were prominent in the lumber and logging business. A permit for the detached garage was issued two months earlier than the permit for the actual home. As the garage appears to include a maid's quarters it is possible that the family lived temporarily over the garage while the home was under construction. In 1944 Fisher and McNulty made repairs to the servant's room.

Block 16, Map Reference #090: The Ed and Lucy Peters Home, 3655 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Ranch style home was constructed in 1949 on the northwest corner of Seventh Street and E. Huntington Boulevard by contractor J.T. Cowan.

#091: The William Rennie Home, 3647 E. Huntington Boulevard. No original building permit is on file with the City of Fresno. The Assessor's assign the construction date as 1928; Huntington Boulevard Homeowners have printed a 1923 date in their 2009 and 2012 calendars. William Rennie is identified as the original owner: he was the manager of the Barton Vineyards and Winery for 20 years.

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#092: The Ralph and Leslie Butler Home, 3635 E. Huntington Boulevard. A building permit was issued to contractors Berklow and Gould on May 17, 1918 for this Colonial Revival style residence. The design of the home is attributed to Coates-Traver architects. The columns on the porch are apparently former City light posts. According to the building permit, a second story was added in 1951 but the location of this addition is unknown.

#093: The David and Neva Newman Home, 3623 E. Huntington Boulevard. This 1920 Prairie style home has Italian Renaissance secondary details. An 8x11 foot addition was permitted in 1941. David Newman was the Manager of the Dry Goods Department of the Kutner Goldstein Department Store and Neva was the owner of Manderin Studios in Fresno and Sacramento.

#094: The David and Neva Newman Home, 3611 E. Huntington Boulevard. The 1914 building permit for this Italian Renaissance style home was apparently the first to be issued for a residence on the boulevard. However, The Dr. Oliver Howard home located at 3263 E. Huntington Boulevard was the first building completed. The Newman home is attributed to the architectural firm of Glass and Butner. The Newmans also owned the residence next door at 3623. The bay on the east end of the house was built as a chapel during the residency of the Roman Bishop of Fresno, A.J. Willinger, who lived here from 1947-1974.

Block 17, Map Reference #095: The A.G. Wishon Home, 3555 E. Huntington Boulevard (HP#291). The Alta Vista Tract was platted in 1911 as a streetcar suburb on either side of the Sunnyside and Recreation Line which had been extended circa 1907 by Albert Graves Wishon to carry Fresno residents out to Recreation Park. Wishon purchased the first parcels in the new subdivision in 1912, a day after the official annexation, and he completed this beautiful Arts and Crafts inspired residence at the corner of Huntington Boulevard and Sixth Street in 1916. The home was designed by the architectural firm fo Coates and Traver. The redwood tree in the front yard was Fresno's first outdoor lighted Christmas tree in 1917.

#096: The Ralph and Jenny Watson Home, 3537 E. Huntington Boulevard (HP#284). This Tudor Revival residence was built for the Watsons in 1922. Jenny Watson was the daughter of Albert Graves Wishon, who initially developed the Alta Vista Tract and who lived next door. A room was added to the Watson Home in 1937 by Farr and Son and a den addition was constructed by Frank Strohl in 1956.

#097: The Thomas and Eleanor MacMichael Home, 3509 E. Huntington Boulevard. This one story modern Ranch home was built in 1947 by contractor R.C. Fisher. Eleanor Watson MacMichael was the granddaughter of A.G. Wishon who subdivided the block first to accommodate a home for his daughter Jenny Wishon Watson and later for his granddaughter and her husband. A 16x27 addition was constructed for the MacMichael Home in 1951 and a 10x13' bedroom was built in 1954.

Block 18, Map Reference #098: The Milton and Elsie Terrill Home, 3465 E. Huntington Boulevard. This variant of the Monterey Revival is the only example of this style on the boulevard. The character defining feature is the second story cantilevered balcony with its wrought iron balcony railing, reminiscent of homes in the French quarter of New Orleans. The house was constructed by the design-build firm of Taylor-Wheeler Builders in 1934. The home was featured in A Field Guide to America's Historic Neighborhoods (p. 47). Unfortunately the original wood sash windows were recently replaced with vinyl.

#099: The Elmer and Irma Noroian Home, 3451 E. Huntington Boulevard. This one story contemporary cottage was constructed in 1974 for Elmer and Irma Noroian who were relocated by the Redevelopment Agency from "S" and Kern Streets. The contractor was Simon Building Construction. Although the house is less than 50 years of age it retains integrity to its period of significance (1974, the year it was built) and thus is a contributor to the historic district.

#100: The Dr. Thomas Collins Home, 3429 E. Huntington Boulevard (non-contributor). This residence was constructed in 1949 by the design-build firm of Taylor-Wheeler Buildings. However it has been significantly altered and is therefore not a contributor to the historic district.

#101: The Julian and Tillie Oestreicher Home, 3401 E. Huntington Boulevard. Julian Oestreicher was the vice president of Gottschalk's Department Store. His brother-in-law was Emil Gottschalk, the founder of Gottschalk's in 1904. The house was completed in 1921 and borrows its plan, its rigorous symmetry and some detailing from the "Hipped Roof with Projecting Wings" of the Italian Renaissance style. Its design is attributed to the architectural firm of Glass and Butner.

Block 19, Map Reference #102: The Fred J. and Mary Dow Home, 3369 E. Huntington Boulevard (HP #286). This distinct one-story Tudor Revival cottage was completed in 1929 and includes several stunning stained glass windows (exterior and interior) with an Art Deco motif. The home was built by and for Fresno pioneer Fred J. Dow who moved to Fresno with his family in 1865. In 1912 Dow organized a contracting and building firm, Dow and Cannon. By 1929 when this house was completed Dow had extensive experience in both commercial and residential building.

#103: The Florrie Holland and William Wilson Home, 3355 E. Huntington Boulevard. No original building permit is on file with the City of Fresno for this Tudor cottage. The County Assessor dates the construction to 1932, Huntington Homeowners Association research assigns a 1928 date and also attributes the design and construction to Taylor-Wheeler Builders. The Taylor-Wheeler files in the City's Historic Preservation archives do not list a project at this address (however the firm is listed as the original owners for the property located next door at 3345 E. Huntington). William "Dick" Wilson was president and secretary of Pearson Realty. Additionally, he was the director of the Fresno County and City Chamber of Commerce and the director of the Fresno Redevelopment Agency.

#104: The Frank and Mary Ellen Griffin Home, 3345 E. Huntington Boulevard. The original owner on the 1928 building permit is the design-build firm of Taylor-Wheeler, which suggests that this Tudor cottage was initially built by the company on speculation. Frank Griffin was a dentist.

#105: The G.W. and Marie Goennheimer Home, 3335 E. Huntington Boulevard. A building permit for this one-story Tudor Revival home was issued on November 3, 1931. It is unlikely that construction was completed before 1932. A character defining feature of this home is the five sided bay window with conical shaped roof.

#106: The C.L. and Ethel Saylor Home, 3327 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Craftsman bungalow was constructed in 1923. The contractor on the building permit is identified as the owner, C.L. Saylor.

#107: The H. H. and Mary Shields Home, 3309 E. Huntington Boulevard. Henry Shields was a partner in the design-build firm of Trewhitt-Shields and Fisher. This 1936 home draws from an eclectic mix of stylistic sources including the Art Moderne and the Louisiana French townhouse. Henry Shields was involved in civic affairs including his service as director of the Fresno Y.M.C.A. for twenty years. In 1959 Harold (Bud) Fine and his wife purchased the home. Harold Fine was partner in the realty firm of Billings and Fine.

#108: The T.W. Haymond Home, 3307 E. Huntington Boulevard. A building permit for a new dwelling valued at \$8,500 was issued to contractor O.D. Atkins on October 13, 1922. This one-story Spanish Eclectic style residence was apparently owned at the time by a T.W. Haymond, although the research provided by the Huntington Boulevard Homeowners Association lists a different builder, O.D. King, and owners, W.L. Wilson followed in 1939 by Senator Hugh Burns and his wife Viola.

Block 20, Map reference #109: The Dr. Oliver Howard Home, 3263 E. Huntington Boulevard (HP# 193). This 1914 Craftsman bungalow was the first home completed on Huntington Boulevard, with a permit issued on June 10, 1914 to contractor Dan Blosser. Dr. Howard was a well-known local dentist.

#110: The Joseph and Teresa Dale Home, 3257 E. Huntington Boulevard. No original building permit is on file with the City but both the County Assessor and the Huntington Association information confirms a 1936 construction date for this Italian Renaissance Revival home. Joseph Dale and his brothers opened a wholesale coffee business in Fresno in 1918. Dale Bros. Coffee grew to be a major company in the San Joaquin Valley and both their former building, as well as the Dale Brothers Coffee Can sign on top of it, are designated historic resources (HP# 247 and 248).

#111: The Arnie and Nectar Avedian Home, 3245 E. Huntington Boulevard. This ranch style residence was constructed in 1951 apparently by the owner, Arnie Avedian, who owned a cabinet shop in town.

#112: The John Godwin Home, 3221 Huntington Boulevard. The building permit for this parcel does not include the construction of this stucco-clad Tudor Revival residence. A permit to alter the garage was issued to contractor O.D. Atkins in 1922 and so it is safe to assume that the 1920 construction date (from Huntington Boulevard Association research) is correct. In 1936 a 10x35' addition was permitted to "rear and in front" which possibly refers to a new porch entry as well as the room on the north west elevation.

#113: The Daniel and Marie Hoak Home, 3211 E. Huntington Boulevard. This one story Tudor Revival home was constructed in 1927 by contractor W.H. Richmond. A 9.5x10 foot addition was permitted in 1951. Daniel Hoak was a major figure in fruit packing and general agriculture in the Fresno area. He was the first chairman of the Raisin Advisory Board, introduced Hereford hogs to California and perfected the vacuum system for removing stems from raisins. He served on numerous fruit packing boards and voluntary associations.

#114: The Newton and Hazel Johnson Home, 3171 E. Huntington Boulevard. A building permit was issued for this Craftsman bungalow on July 20, 1918. Newton and Hazel Johnson were the first residents. Newton Johnson was an attorney who served as the President of the Fresno City Board of Education and the Fresno County Bar Association.

Block 20 continued:

#115: The J.W. and Genevieve Kennard Home, 3161 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Craftsman bungalow was constructed in 1922 by Yarnell and Garges.

#116: The O.D. and Ida Mae Atkins Home, 3153 E. Huntington Boulevard. Contractor O.D. Atkins built this Craftsman bungalo in 1918 and resided briefly on the boulevard with his wife. Atkins was the contractor for several other properties on the street.


#117: The R. Bernard and Nellabelle Dickey Home, 3141 E. Huntington Boulevard (HR#019). The one story Tudor Revival home was constructed in 1928 at a value of \$3,000 by the Fresno Home Builders. Apparently the home was a rental for several years but by 1940 was owned by R. Bernard and Nellabelle Dickey, Bernard was born circa 1905, the son of William J. Dickey, an early Fresno pioneer who had located to the city by 1880. Upon his death in 1912, W. J. Dickey bequeathed \$10,000 to the City of Fresno to be used in the purchase of apparatus for children's playgrounds. Dickey Playground, first established in 1910, was later named for W.J. Dickey.


#118: The J.E. Burnett Home, 3135 E. Huntington Boulevard. No original building permit is on file for this Craftsman bungalow although a new woodshed was constructed at the parcel in 1925 by the owner, J.E. Burnett. Huntington Boulevard Homeowners Association research indicates a 1921 construction date.

#119: The A.B. and Mary Kirk Home, 3125 E. Huntington Boulevard. This Craftsman bungalow was constructed in 1920 by contractor C.V. Smith. In 1930 Fred and Virginia Billings bought the home. Billings with business partner Rhine Meyering developed Huntington Boulevard as part of the Alta Vista Tract when they acquired the subdivision in 1914. The Billings apparently moved around on the street as they also owned the 2-story Colonial Revival Home located at 3650 E. Huntington.

#120: The W.G. and Blanche McGuire Home, 3115 E. Huntington Boulevard. This stucco-clad Craftsman bungalow was constructed in 1922 by Valley Construction Company. In 1952 the owner, at that time, Anthony Bianco, added a 6x20 foot room to the garage as a "rumpus room." The rumpus room was a playroom which was a popular addition to homes in the 1950s.

#121: The Andrew and Marjorie Drew Home, 3105 E. Huntington Boulevard. A one-story Spanish Revival style home anchors the northeast corner of First Street and E. Huntington. It was constructed in 1936 by contractor Albert Gatti for an estimated price of \$6,000. Arthur Drew was an attorney and his wife was a realtor. This is one of several homes featured in A Field Guide to America's Historic Neighborhoods (p. 47).

Conservation/District Plan: Huntington Boulevard August 25, 2015

Pursuant to Section 12-1610(f) of the Fresno Municipal Code, (the Historic Preservation Ordinance), once a historic district has been designated by the City Council a Conservation/District Plan must be developed that stipulates how the preservation objectives of the District will be met. The following plan has been developed by staff and property owners within the Huntington Boulevard Historic District. The Huntington Boulevard Historic District Conservation Plan was approved by the Historic Preservation Commission at a public hearing held on August 24, 2015.

12-1610(f)

(i) A statement of significance which includes a description of contributing resources and significant elements:

Huntington Boulevard is the heart of one of Fresno's most architecturally distinct neighborhoods. Grand homes, in a variety of styles, stand side-by-side with more modest bungalows, all facing onto a wide boulevard bisected by a grassy median, the former right-of-way for the Sunnyside-Recreation streetcar line.

The Boulevard is the center of the "Alta Vista Tract" which was first platted in 1911 and annexed to the City on January 23, 1912. Homes on the boulevard date from 1914 to 1977 and represent some of the finest examples of Craftsman and Period Revival architecture in the City. Several residences were designed by prominent local and regional architects and/or design-build firms including Butner and Glass; Coates and Traver; Felchlin, Franklin and Shaw; H. Rafael Lake; Fred Swartz and Taylor-Wheeler Builders. W.D. Coates who served as the California State Architect from 1909-1911 designed the only French Eclectic style residence on the boulevard as his home. Henry Shields, a partner in the design-build firm of Trewhitt-Shields and Fisher, also had a home built for himself on the boulevard.

Shortly after its annexation in 1912 Huntington Boulevard became the preferred address for the intellectual and business elite of Fresno. Property owners included A.G. Wishon; Fred Billings, who with his business partner Rhine Meyering developed the Alta Vista Tract; Fresno Bee editor Carlos McClatchy; the President of Gottschalks Department Store Abraham Blum; and numerous attorneys, teachers, physicians, ranchers and local business owners.

An architectural survey of the 121 residential properties lining both sides of the boulevard from First Street to Cedar Avenue was completed by City of Fresno Historic Preservation staff in the spring of 2015. The survey concluded that of the 121 homes, all but 5 were eligible as contributors to a proposed Huntington Boulevard Historic District. The Fresno City Council at a public hearing held on May 21, 2015 designated a Page 12 Huntington Boulevard Historic District. However, the Council used its discretion pursuant to FMC 12- FMC 12-1613(b) to modify the recommendation of the City's Historic Preservation Commission by stipulating that any boulevard property owners wishing to "opt out" of the District for reasons of personal preference could do so by stating their intent on the record or by submitting a notarized form to the City. By June 30, 2015, 38 property owners, representing 37 residential buildings and one vacant parcel, had responded with a notarized request to be excluded. These properties were henceforth removed from the District which was redrawn to include 84 parcels, of which 80 are contributors and 4 are non-contributors. The neighbors who opted out of the District for reasons of personal preference may return to the District in the future by following a simple procedure that will be determined by the City at a future date. The District includes the former streetcar corridor as well as the mature landscaping within the park strips which was designed in part by A. G. Wishon.

(ii) The goals and objectives of the proposed district:

The dominant ideas and mindsets that helped shape many of Fresno's early neighborhoods have largely been forgotten. The many older neighborhoods which once provided families of varied income levels with a neighborhood that provided a diversity of architectural styles, home sizes, and quality streetscapes have largely disappeared or are evident only in remnants. The loss and degradation of these former neighborhoods occurred because the original ideas that created those neighborhoods were forgotten over time.

In reviewing the Huntington Blvd neighborhood, it is easy to assess whether the dominant ideas and mindsets that created the neighborhood were successful and worthy of preservation by asking some simple questions like: Does the quality of this residential development say 'welcome' to the observer? Does it feel right emotionally? Is it good enough for our city? Have the quality of life characteristics with which it was built withstood the test of time? Does its design promote connectivity with neighbors and visitors? Does it contain advice for the future through its continued existence?

We believe the answers to all these questions are a resounding 'yes.' This Huntington Blvd neighborhood has endured because it was a success and

because the mindsets and decisions that made it such a success have been remembered and valued.

The reason for designating the Huntington Blvd Historic District is to protect, preserve and promote the architectural and historic significance of this Page 13 residential neighborhood and, while so doing, to retain the dominant ideas and mindsets that were carried out by its originators.

Like other residential historic districts in Fresno, this objective shall be accomplished through the application of design review standards that are based on the Secretary of Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties as required under the City of Fresno's Historic Preservation Ordinance. These Standards will apply to principal and street elevations, that is, those portions of the property that can easily be seen from the local street. District design review standards shall not prohibit residents from modernizing and updating the interiors of their homes or from making additions to rear elevations with approved permits from the city's building division. District residents recognize that change can be important for economic revitalization and stabilization of this high quality, historic neighborhood.

The means by which the conservation objectives will be enforced: (iii)

Permits required by the City of Fresno will be reviewed first by the City's Historic Preservation Project Manager and, as appropriate, referred to the City's Historic Preservation Commission as stipulated in Section 12-1618 of the Historic Preservation Ordinance. Most permits can be reviewed and signed off at the counter although it is advisable to make an appointment with the Historic Preservation Project Manager to be expeditious. More complicated projects may require Commission review and may take up to one month.

Identification of the standards and guidelines which will be applied to (iv) design review within the district:

Pursuant to the requirements of the Historic Preservation Ordinance, the Secretary of Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties shall apply to activities that require permits from the City of Fresno. It is important to note that the Standards were developed by the Department of the Interior and provide guidelines that are intended to promote (not require) responsible

preservation practices in order to protect our significant cultural resources. However, for clarification, the following stipulations are made:

A. Any and all improvements made to properties prior to the adoption of the conservation plan shall be exempt from the provisions of this plan.

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- B. Residents are not prohibited from modernizing or updating the interiors of their homes. Property owners are encouraged, however, to retain original features that contribute to the value and aesthetic qualities of the home such as casework, moldings, fireplace surrounds, original tile, hardwood flooring, etc.
- C. Activities that <u>do not</u> involve the processing of a Plan Amendment, zoning change, Conditional Use Permit (CUP), variance or demolition and which also do not normally require a building permit from the City's building division shall <u>not</u> be subject to this Conservation Plan with the exception of the replacement of façade windows (please see D). Activities that require no further review include:
 - Exterior paint color.
 - 2. General maintenance including repairs and in-kind replacements as long as the character defining features of the property are not altered (see 12-1618 (d) of the HPO). "Character-defining" refers to the architectural elements that create "style" and help to differentiate a Craftsman bungalow from a mid-century Modern Ranch and include, as examples, the porch balustrade, a Spanish tile roof, multi-sash windows, etc.
 - 3. Garden upkeep, such as routine trimming of trees and shrubs.
 - Minor repair, replacement or addition of walkways on the residential parcel versus the public sidewalk.
- D. Changes to windows on principal street elevations¹ require review. Windows are one of the most important design elements of a home that contribute to its style and ultimately to its resale value. Both the State Energy Commission and Pacific Gas & Electric have published information

¹ The "principal street elevation" for most homes is the view of the front of the home from Huntington Blvd's public right-of-way. Applied to home situated on a corner, the "principal street elevations" would include the sides of the home visible from the public-right-of-ways on both Huntington and the applicable side street.

which proves that windows in homes built before 1938 are NOT a major cause of energy loss and gain, as often as is assumed. Currently the City of Fresno does not require permits for the replacement of windows unless the piercing (size) is changed. However, this Conservation Plan provides guidance and review for windows on street elevations which should be Page 15 repaired or replaced in kind, with like materials and like style. Vinyl sash windows will generally not be viewed as a good replacement for original wood sash but products that appear to look like wood (dual pane, synthetic wood clad tilt-packs as examples) will be acceptable. Faux muntins2 (rather than true divided lights3) are also not allowed for principle elevations of the residence. Windows on the rear of the home or in ancillary structures will not be reviewed.

- E. Should a property suffer extreme damage by fire, earthquake, subsidence or flooding the provisions for economic feasibility for reconstruction as set forth in section 12-1618(e)(i) of the Historic Preservation Ordinance will be followed. If the home cannot be salvaged the property owner will not be required to replace the home as it was; rather any new infill shall be a product of good design and reviewed for its compatibility with the historic setting and architectural character of the residential District.
- F. Designation within a historic district also does not require that a property be restored back to a former condition or era, however, a property owner may elect to rehabilitate the home and bring back original features. (See: Restoration Treatment Standard from the Department of Interiors Standards.)
- G. Removal of a broken or damaged tree or broken water pipes will be allowed and expedited pursuant to Section 12-1618(e) of the HPO.
- H. As with the Secretary's Standards, repair and replacement of original architectural features, paving, fencing, etc. may be made using new and even synthetic materials if these materials retain the look, quality and feel of the original.

The wooden supporting moldings (or Muntins) hold the individual panes of glass in place within a window sash, or a window frame.

³ Divided lights are window panes.

- I. Alterations or additions to the residence other than the principal street elevations are not subject to this Conservation Plan. A new addition on the rear of the home, a new swimming pool, etc. will still require a building permit from the City of Fresno but will not be reviewed under this Conservation Plan. However, consultation with staff or the Historic Page | 6 Preservation Commission is available at the request of the property owner in order to encourage compatibility. Neighbors are always welcome to contact the City's Historic Preservation Project Manager for advice as to how best to restore or rehabilitate their property.
- J. Wood shingles do not have to be replaced in kind but Architectural grade composition shingles should be preferred.
- K. The addition of pavement in the front yard for the purpose of accommodating parking shall be prohibited.
- L. Fences above three feet in height, other than wrought iron which may be four feet, are prohibited in front yards in Fresno unless an exemption is granted by the Development and Resource Management Department. Chain link fences in the front yard shall be prohibited under this Conservation Plan.
- M. The area between the street and the sidewalk is city owned property that must be maintained by the homeowner. Modification to trees and plantings on this strip are subject to review by the City of Fresno, whether or not a property is contained within the Huntington Blvd Historic District boundary. Huntington Boulevard is not only a designated historic district it is also a designated "scenic drive." The open-space, grassy median is available for neighbors and members of the public to enjoy.
- N. Existing front and side setbacks shall be retained.
- (v) The activities regulated by the Conservation/District Plan which shall exclude activities determined exempt under this article.
 - A. There are no additional activities excluded from this plan.

(vi) The public education/outreach program to be conducted by the Conservation/District Plan.

A. Property owners shall work collaboratively with the City of Fresno Historic Preservation staff to provide occasional walking tours or other events which showcase the area's history. However, property owners within the District are NOT required to provide access to their homes unless they so desire.

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- (vii) Annual report to the Commission on compliance with and implementation of the Conservation/District Plan:
 - A. The annual report will be crafted by the City's Historic Preservation Officer in concert with the Huntington Boulevard Historic Preservation Committee.

Benefits of designation within a Historic District:

Protection of home owner's investments: buyers and sellers know the aspects that
make a particular area attractive will be protected over a period of time. Real
estate agents in many cities use historic district status as a marketing tool to sell
properties.

Honor and Status: the property owner may purchase a plaque as approved for

their home. (For an order form please contact H.P. Staff.)

 Direct and indirect economic benefits for marketing: may include improved property values.

 Protection under Fresno's Historic Preservation Ordinance and the California Environmental Quality Act: this adds a greater level of stability and economic certainty to the area. Historic properties may be demolished but it is more difficult as they are assumed to be important community assets.

 Coordinated community goals: the knowledge that we are working together to insure this beautiful neighborhood will continue to provide high quality living

options for future generations to enjoy.

 Enhanced business recruitment potential: companies continually re-locate to communities that offer workers a higher quality of life which is greatly enhanced by successful local preservation programs and stable historic districts.

 Educational benefits from all historic preservation efforts: these districts can help explain the development of a place, its source of inspiration, and technological

advances. They are a record of our past and our communities.


 Help for the environment: historical districts are an example of sustainable development. Historic district revitalization can, and should, be part of a comprehensive environmental policy.


- Access to the California Historical Building Code: Examples include exemption from Title 24 and the state's Cool Roof standard.


Clarence Bernhauer was the Vice President of the Fresno Planing Mill, one of the most prosperous businesses of its kind in the San Joaquin Valley. Bernhauer was born in Rock Island, Illinois in 1886 and came to Fresno with his family as a young child. He entered a partnership with his father in farming and used \$3,000 of his profits to invest in the Mill which was organized by this brother, Arthur W. Bernhauer. He and his wife were prominent in civic affairs. The Bernhauer home is an elegant example of the Italian Renaissance Revival which was reintroduced for residential building in the late 19th century and closely replicated the palazzi of Northern Italy. The property appears to be eligible for both the California Register and Fresno's Local Register of Historic Resources for its association with the Bernhauer family (Criterion 2, ii, as an excellent example of an architectural style, The Italian Renaissance Revival (Criterion 3, iii) and as an early property and contributor to the proposed Huntington Blvd. Historic District (Criterion I)

This two story Colonial Revival Home was constructed for Fred and Virginia Billings in 1938 and is attributed to architect Charles E. Butner. Fred Billings was a native of Marshalltown, Iowa and came to Fresno in September 1910. He went into real estate with Rhine Meyering (aka Billings and Meyering). In 1914 the partnership acquired the Alta Vista Tract, completed the infrastructure and began to market the subdivision in earnest (Kerckhoff Avenue Survey 1991). The two men remained in business together until Meyering's retirement in 1935. Fred Billings was an important figure in civic affairs: he served as the first chair of the County Planning Commission, the Director of the Fresno County Chamber of Commerce and additionally was the Director of the Sanger Citrus Association. The residence at 3650 E. Huntington was one of several which Billings owned along Huntington Boulevard, Charles E. Butner received his architectural training under Paul Cret at the University of Pennsylvania. In 1914 Butner and former college classmate Edward Glass formed the firm of Glass and Butner in Fresno. During the Depression Butner relocated to Salinas where he built a thriving architectural practice in the Monterey Bay area (Powell 1996). The residence at 3650 E. Huntington Boulevard appears to be eligible for both the Local Register and the California Register for its association and contribution to the proposed Huntington Blvd. Historic District (Criterion i, 1) for its association with Fred Billings, a civic leader who developed the Alta Vista Tract (Criterion ii, 2) and as an example of the extant work of a major architect, Charles E. Butner (iii, 3).



F. Rex Sporleder was associated with the Hollenbeck-Bush Planing Mill which was founded in Fresno in 1890. Sporleder came to Fresno in 1922 from Wauwatosa, Wisconsin and initially worked as a draftsman for the mill. In 1932 he became a part owner, in 1940 he is listed as the Manager and by 1950 he was the sole owner. His wife Vera was a teacher at Roosevelt High School. Apparently the Sporleders loved to entertain and the open plan of the first floor as well as the finished basement were the site of numerous social events. The home was built by the contracting firm of Fisher and McNulty. Hugh McNulty was born in St. Louis in 1892 and lived in Fresno from Infancy. He graduated from Stanford University in Mining Engineering and formed a partnership with R.P. Fisher in 1920. The company constructed numerous buildings of note including the Pantages Theatre and Twining Laboratories, the latter designed by Charles Butner (Winchell, History of Fresno County). It is unclear whether the company had the expertise to design a home such as this; one assumes not. The home is of architectural interest due to the overall design, the hexagonal breakfast nook (a feature seen on a few other Huntington Boulevard homes), and the interior use of a variety of exotic woods. Fisher and McNulty was an important contracting firm in early Fresno and Sporleder was ultimately the owner of a planing mill that played a significant role in the development of this city. The home appears to be eligible

This charming Tudor Revival cottage was constructed in 1930. The first residents were William Eugene and Elsie [Askew] Brinker. Eugene Brinker was a co-owner with his mother (D.S. French) of the French Furniture Company, located at 2949 Fresno Street. He and his mother also constructed at least two bungalow courts in the Tower District, both built by R. G. Leach. Although the residence has been attributed to Taylor-Wheeler, a highly respected design-build firm in Fresno during this period, the building permit does not attribute the home to this partnership and no other confirmation in the Taylor-Wheeler files could be found. Nevertheless, the home with its hexagonal bay and decorative strapwork is a distinctive example of the Tudor Revival, a style of residential building particularly popular in Fresno between the two World Wars and which was executed in simple vernacular expressions as well as in formal architect designed buildings (Criterion iii). Additionally, it is a contributor to the proposed Huntington Boulevard Historic District (Criterion i) and to the NR eligible Alta Vista Tract.

This residence was built for Floyd Bekins on Lots B and C, Block 15 of the Alta Vista Tract in 1926 for a value of \$16,100 (Building permit #5516). The tract was platted in 1911 as a streetcar suburb on either side of the Sunnyside and Recreation Line which had been extended circa 1907 by Albert Graves Wishon to carry Fresno residents out to Recreation Park (Garcia 2003). In 1925-6 Bekins also oversaw the construction of a new 7-story warehouse for the Bekins Van and Storage Company at 301 Van Ness Avenue, valued at \$110,000 (Building permit #6186). In 1930 the home was sold to Carlos and Phebe McClatchy (National Register draft). Carlos McClatchy was the son of C.K. McClatchy who with his brother owned the Sacramento Bee. When the McClatchys locked to Fresno to expand their newspaper empire they sent Carlos, who had served as an Associate Editor in Sacramento. The first issue of the Fresno Bee was published on October 17, 1922 with Carlos McClatchy as Editor. In 1932 the McClatchys purchased the rival newspaper the Republican (Clough 1986: 410-412). Carlos McClatchy died a year later in 1933 and his wife Phebe remained in the home, installing an elevator in 1956 (Work order #8667). Mrs. McClatchy married Judge Philip Conley in 1958 and was active in local arts and cultural institutions in Fresno serving on the Board of Trustees of the California State University and Colleges for ten years (National Register draft). The home is thus associated with two families who have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of local history, Floyd Bekins and Carlos and Phebe McClatchy. The property appears to be individually eligible to the Local Register of Historic Resources under Criteria i and ii. The home is also a significant and stately example of the Tudor Revival style (Criterion iii). In addition, it is a significant contributor to the character of the neighborhood and the proposed Huntington Boulevard Historic District.




This residence was built in 1921 for Ned Prescott and family on lot A and the west half of Lot B, Block 15 of the Alta Vista Tract (Building permit #311). The tract was platted in 1911 as a streetcar suburb on either side of the Sunnyside and Recreation Line which had been extended circa 1907 by Albert Graves Wishon to carry Fresno residents out to Recreation Park (Garcia 2003). C.M. "Ned" and Gertrude Prescott came to Fresno from Iowa and were prominent in the lumber and logging business. Prescott and his uncle C.S. Pierce established Prescott Lumber Co and thereafter Valley Lumber and were active in the early logging of the Hume district. Mr. Prescott ran unsuccessfully for mayor and along with his wife was important in civic and community affairs (NR draft 1994). The home is a particularly grand example of a variation of the Tudor Revival, a style of residential building particularly popular in Fresno between the two World Wars from simple vernacular expressions to architect designed buildings (Criterion iii). The property is also associated with a family important in early Fresno, the Prescotts (Criterion ii). This distinctive two-story home is located on Block 17 of the Alta Vista Tract and was the residence of Albert Graves Wishon, who helped to develop the subdivision. 

Albert Graves Wishon was born on November 6, 1858 at Coppeges Mill, Missouri. His early experience and interest in farming and civil engineering provided a foundation for his entrepreneurial work in Fresno. He built the San Joaquin Valley's first power plant on the Kaweah River east of Visalia: the Mt. Whitney Power Company which began operations on June 30, 1899 (Heritage Fresno:62). Wishon left the Mt. Whitney Company in 1902 and that same year convinced three Los Angeles investors, A.C. Balch, W.G. Kerckhoff and Henry E. Huntington, to purchase the faltering San Joaquin Power Company. In 1903 the company was renamed the San Joaquin Light and Power Corporation and included in its holdings the Fresno City Water Company and the Fresno City Railway, which was renamed the Fresno Traction Company. Wishon was appointed the General Manager.

Wishon purchased and improved Recreation Park (located at Cedar and Ventura) and in order to bring visitors to the park he struck a deal with the Pacific Improvement Company which owned the 190-acre alfalfa field immediately east of downtown Fresno and north of Ventura. (Although the 1906 Sanborn indicates street blocks throughout this area, there apparently was no development and it was only a paper subdivision.) The agreement allowed Wishon to lay a double track down Mariposa Street. Passenger service on the expanded Sunnyside and Recreation Line began after 1907.

The land adjacent to the streetcar line became increasingly desirable for residential use. The "Alta Vista Tract" was mapped by William Stranaham and officially platted in 1911. The tract was annexed to the City on January 23, 1912 and next day Wishon bought the first lots on Huntington Boulevard (the former Mariposa Street). Wishon was clearly involved with the development of the tract and in the covenants that were included in deeds. By 1920 there were 267 homes in the Tract, most of them on the side streets of Balch, Platt, Kerckhoff and Verrue.

The San Joaquin Light and Power Corporation merged with Pacific Gas and Electric in 1930 and Wishon remained a director and vice chairman of the board until his death. A.G. Wishon was also involved in numerous other enterprises in the Fresno area and served, for example, as a director of the Sun Maid Raisin Company. In later years he operated orchards and vineyards with his son-in-law, Ralph W. Watson (who lived in the Tudor Revival style home next door).

The A.G. and Henrietta Wishon Home was designed by the architectural firm of Coates and Traver. William D. Coates studied with Paul Cret at the University of Pennsylvania and from 1909 to 1911 he served as the California State Architect. In 1911 he formed a partnership with Harrison B. Traver, a former college classmate at the University of Pennsylvania. In 1914 the firm moved to Fresno where they continued to practice until 1925. They designed several local buildings and residences of note, including the Liberty Theatre and Fresno High School as well as the Wishon Home and the Butler Home at 3635 E. Huntington (Powell 1996). Coates also lived on Huntington Boulevard and designed the French Eclectic style home (known locally as the "Witches House") at 3901 E. Huntington for his own residence.

The A.G. Wishon Home appears to be eligible to the National Register of Historic Places, the California Register of Historical Resources and the Local Register of Historic Resources under Criterion A/1/I as one of the first homes in the Alta Vista Tract, under Criterion B/2/ii for Wishon's role in local and regional history and under Criterion C/3/iii as the work of a master, the architectural firm of Coates and Traver and as a superb and eclectic example of the Arts and Crafts aesthetic. A contributor to the home is the 88 foot tall California Coast Redwood in the front yard which is decorated each year and has been honored by the National Christmas Tree Association as the Nation's Tallest Living Lighted Decorated Christmas Tree (December 2001 HB Calendar).

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



This residence was built for Jenny and Ralph Watson in 1922 on lot 11 and lot 12 of Block 17 of the Alta Vista Tract (Building permit #1561). The tract was platted in 1911 as a streetcar suburb on either side of the Sunnyside and Recreation Line which had been extended circa 1907 by Jenny Watson's father, Albert Graves Wishon to carry Fresno residents out to Recreation Park (Garcia 2003). Albert Wishon purchased the first parcels in the new subdivision in 1912, a day after the official annexation, and he completed a beautiful Arts and Crafts inspired residence at the corner of Huntington Boulevard and Sixth Street in 1916. Block 17 was subdivided a few years later to allow first for the Watson residence and later for the corner parcel to accommodate the 1947 residence for Wishon's granddaughter, Eleanor Wishon MacMichael. The Watson home is an excellent example of the Tudor Revival, a style loosely based on a variety of Medieval English prototypes and which was popular in the Fresno area between the two World Wars. The Ralph and Jenny Watson Home appears to be eligible for Fresno's Local Register of Historic Resources under Criteria i, ii and iii as for its association with the Alta Vista Tract, the Wishon family and for its architectural significance. The home is also a contributor to the proposed Local Register Huntington Boulevard Historic District and a contributor to the NR eligible Alta Vista Tract.

Bernard was born circa 1905 the son of William J. Dickey, an early Fresno pioneer who located to the city by 1880. Upon his death in 1912, W. J. Dickey bequeathed \$25,000 for public purposes. The sum of \$10,000 was willed to the City of Fresno to be used in the purchase of apparatus for the children's playgrounds and "of such a character and kind as will be most beneficial and enjoyable for the children using such grounds" (Vandor 1919). Dickey Playground, first established in 1910, was later named for W.J. Dickey.

The Dickey home is located within the Alta Vista Tract, which was platted in 1911 as a streetcar suburb. The property faces the grassy median that once carried the Sunnyside and Recreation Line which had been extended circa 1907 by Albert Graves Wishon to carry Fresno residents out to Recreation Park (Garcia 2003). Huntington Boulevard is one of Fresno's most architecturally distinct neighborhoods with its mix of architect-designed properties situated side-by-side with more modest ranch homes and bungalows. The neighborhood appears to be eligible for proposed listing as a historic district and the Dickey Home is therefore a contributor to this Local Register district. The home is indirectly assovciated with a prominent pioneer family and is a lovely but typical Tudor Revival style residence. It does not appear to be individually eligible for listing on the Local Register but does appear to merit listing as a Heritage Property and as a "resource which is worthy of preservation" (FMC 12-1603(n)).







It is stucco clad, cross clipped gabled with simple decorative roof beams on the façade and exposed rafter tails on the side elevations. The partial width front porch is fully enclosed with both a primary and secondary entrance. The front door faces south and is glass and wood as is the secondary entrance which faces east onto the porch. This side door is framed by tall wood windows on each side with 3/1 lights.
