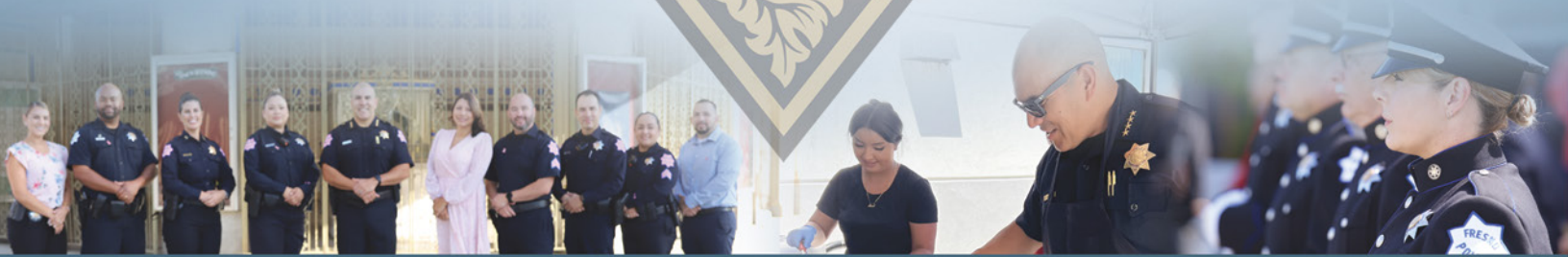

The mission of the Fresno Police Department is to enhance safety, service, and trust with our community.

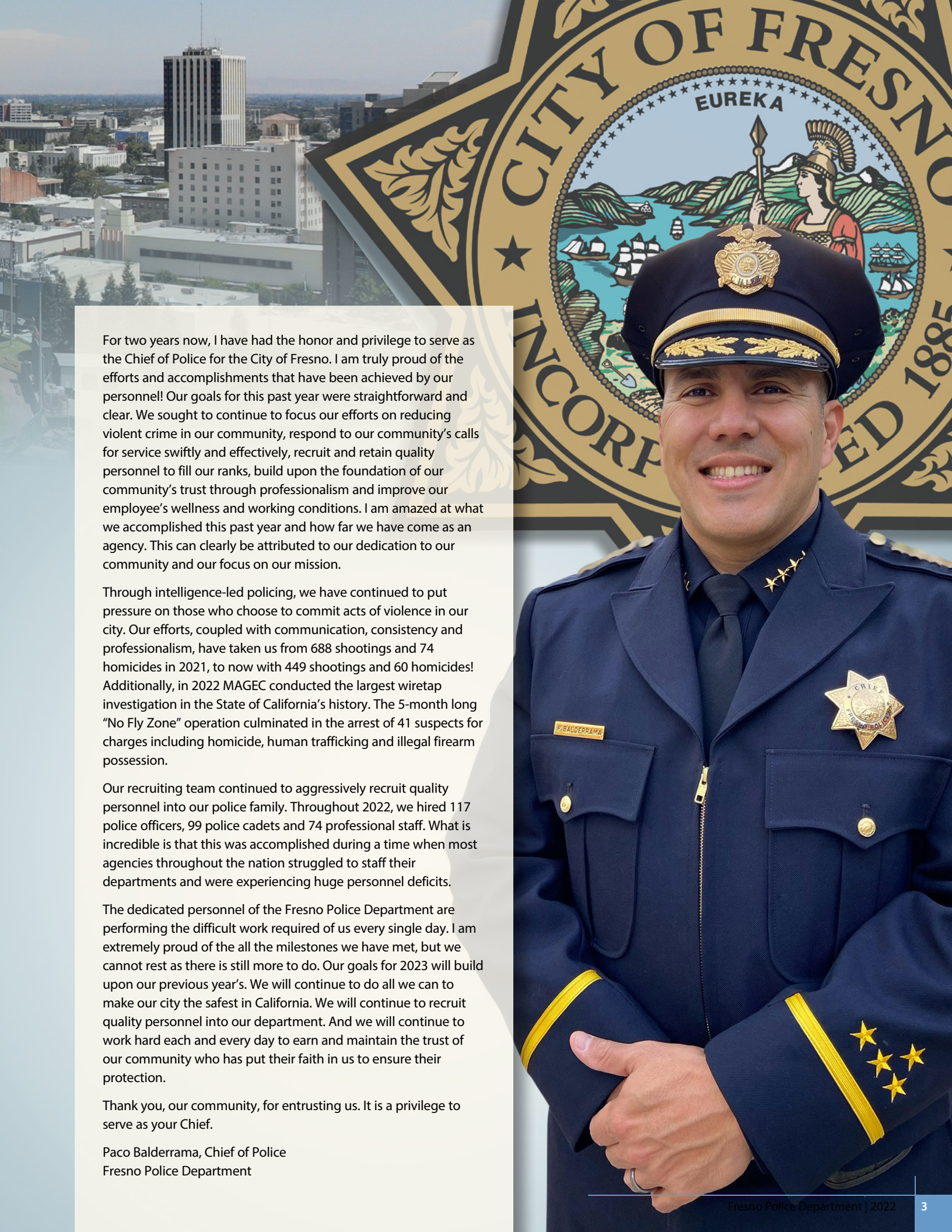
LAW ENFORCEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

AS A LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER, my fundamental duty is to serve mankind; to safeguard lives and property, to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation, and the peaceful against violence or disorder, and to respect the Constitutional rights of all men to liberty, equality and justice.

I WILL keep my private life unsullied as an example to all; maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn, or ridicule; develop self restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed in both my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the laws of the land and the regulations of my agency. Whatever I see or hear of confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I WILL never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

For two years now, I have had the honor and privilege to serve as the Chief of Police for the City of Fresno. I am truly proud of the efforts and accomplishments that have been achieved by our personnel! Our goals for this past year were straightforward and clear. We sought to continue to focus our efforts on reducing violent crime in our community, respond to our community's calls for service swiftly and effectively, recruit and retain quality personnel to fill our ranks, build upon the foundation of our community's trust through professionalism and improve our employee's wellness and working conditions. I am amazed at what we accomplished this past year and how far we have come as an agency. This can clearly be attributed to our dedication to our community and our focus on our mission.

Through intelligence-led policing, we have continued to put pressure on those who choose to commit acts of violence in our city. Our efforts, coupled with communication, consistency and professionalism, have taken us from 688 shootings and 74 homicides in 2021, to now with 449 shootings and 60 homicides! Additionally, in 2022 MAGEC conducted the largest wiretap investigation in the State of California's history. The 5-month long "No Fly Zone" operation culminated in the arrest of 41 suspects for charges including homicide, human trafficking and illegal firearm possession.

Our recruiting team continued to aggressively recruit quality personnel into our police family. Throughout 2022, we hired 117 police officers, 99 police cadets and 74 professional staff. What is incredible is that this was accomplished during a time when most agencies throughout the nation struggled to staff their departments and were experiencing huge personnel deficits.

The dedicated personnel of the Fresno Police Department are performing the difficult work required of us every single day. I am extremely proud of the all the milestones we have met, but we cannot rest as there is still more to do. Our goals for 2023 will build upon our previous year's. We will continue to do all we can to make our city the safest in California. We will continue to recruit quality personnel into our department. And we will continue to work hard each and every day to earn and maintain the trust of our community who has put their faith in us to ensure their protection.

Thank you, our community, for entrusting us. It is a privilege to serve as your Chief.

PATROL DIVISION

The 450-person Patrol Division provides the first police response to emergencies, crime, and disorder throughout all 130 square miles of Fresno. Working out of five district stations, the Patrol Division serves every neighborhood by responding to calls for service, improving traffic safety, mediating disputes, investigating crimes, recovering

evidence, and arresting wanted and dangerous criminals. Our personnel are specially trained to de-escalate crisis events, identify crime trends, access community resources, and solve problems. We utilize the latest in technology to ensure a safe, effective, efficient, and coordinated response to help our community.

The **SOUTHWEST** Policing District

The Southwest Policing District provided service to those living and working within 36 square miles affectionately known as the “Golden Westside”. The district’s seven “Patrol Beats” include the downtown business district, the iconic Water Tower, government buildings,

Selland Arena, Chukchansi Park, the Chaffee Zoo, and Roeding Park.

In 2022, the Southwest District saw a substantial reduction in shootings. There was a 39% decrease in shooting incidents with 119 shootings reported, compared to 195 in 2021.

This can be contributed to not only the efforts of our personnel, but our community as well.

District priorities and successes this year were achieved through our ongoing partnerships and community engagement efforts with service organizations, community leaders, Bringing Broken Neighborhoods Back to Life members, and with those who worked tirelessly to keep our community safe.

The **CENTRAL** Policing District

The Central Policing District provides police service to a diverse community comprised of residential, commercial, business districts, to include the historic Tower District. We serve the area from Ashlan down to Belmont Avenues, bordered by Golden State Highway (State Route 99), and running East to the boundary of First Avenue.

In 2022, the Central District saw significant progress with reducing violent crime. Homicides were reduced by 46%, shootings were down 34.2% with 96 shootings compared to 146 in 2021. Most importantly, there were 185 fewer victims of violent crime, with a 12.4% decrease from 2021. This was accomplished through proactive and

intelligence-based policing along with the seizure of 146 firearms.

Every officer and member of our team engages with our community, participating in community events throughout the year. On a daily basis, we collaborate with resident, business, faith, government, educational, and other communities and groups in developing long term partner relationships.

The **SOUTHEAST** Policing District

The Southeast Policing District is home to over 150,000 residents that make up a unique and diverse community. Southeast continued to experience several changes in 2022, from staffing to new community partnerships to the implementation of District Safety Teams. Officers from the district were involved in a variety of community events in 2022. These events improve our relationships with the community and allow the officers and community members a chance to meet with one another.

In addition to large special events, Southeast personnel attended over 100 community events ranging from block parties to “Coffee with a Cop” and holiday food deliveries to families in need. Community partnerships and outreach are a vital part of our district, and we can’t wait to see what 2023 brings. Additionally, on April 15, 2022, the Southeast Policing District Station was

named “Phia Vang”, in honor of fallen Fresno Police Officer Phia Vang.

The Southeast District saw a decrease in violent crime this year, with the total number of murders down 44%, total number of shootings down 39% and 203 illegal firearms seized.

The **NORTHEAST** Policing District

The Northeast Policing District encompasses over 30 square miles and services a population of more than 130,000 residents. The district reaches from the San Joaquin River on the north, to the Fresno Yosemite International Airport on the south, and extends from Blackstone Avenue east all the way to the City of Clovis border. The Northeast Policing District is home to Fashion Fair and River Park, two major shopping and entertainment attractions in the central valley. California State University, Fresno and Woodward Park are also located in the Northeast District, along with St. Agnes and Kaiser Hospitals.

In addition to handling calls for service and investigating crime, Northeast District personnel engaged members

of the community during a number of fun and rewarding events. From the holiday Santa’s Village festivities, National Night out events and regular “Coffee With a Cop” sessions, Northeast District officers worked hard to develop and maintain partnerships with community members.

The **NORTHWEST** Policing District

The Northwest Policing District has settled into its post-COVID way of life. Our District Station front counter was open all year and has been providing Monday-Friday daytime hours customer service. When our front counter staff is not helping customers, they are also answering telephone inquiries and calls for service that can be handled over the telephone. Our Crime Prevention Community Service Officer was once again busy coordinating community events and organizing in-person Neighborhood Watch meetings. In 2022, we participated in 53 community events. I will always thank both the Pinedale Community Center and the Teague Community Center for inviting us to partner with their great efforts in supporting the children of their neighborhoods.

One of the big changes for Northwest is the growth in both commercial and residential areas near Herndon and Freeway 99, specifically, the Marketplace at El Paseo shopping center. The residents who live in this area now enjoy a short drive for much of their shopping and dining needs.

On the crime front, Northwest saw a 21.2 % decrease in the number of motor vehicle thefts compared to 2021 going from 673 to 530 incidents. We also had a 12 % decrease in the number of vehicle burglaries compared to 2021 going from 482 to 424 incidents. Northwest has also decreased our commercial and residential burglaries by over 5% going from 946 to 893 incidents.

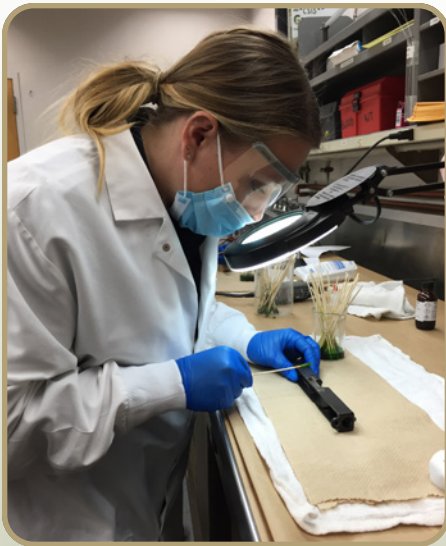


SUPPORT DIVISION

The Support Division's mission is to provide support by deploying multiple teams with specialized training (CIT, HART, K9, CRU and Mounted Unit), answering and dispatching 911 calls, implementing new technology and equipment, ensuring traffic safety, and disseminating accurate crime data. Additional critical functions of the Support Division include Records, Crime Scene Investigations, Air Support, Property and Evidence, and Fleet management. Specialty teams including SWAT, EOD and Crisis Negotiations are also part of the Support Division team. In keeping with a focus on community and Fresno youth, the Support Division is responsible for fielding over 20 Student Resource Officers (SRO's) assigned to schools within the Fresno, Central and Sanger Unified School Districts. In an effort to continue building trust with our community, the Police Community Relations team expanded in 2022 and includes PAL, the Chaplaincy and Volunteer services.

VOLUNTEER SERVICES UNIT

During 2022 the Volunteer Services Unit was comprised of an average of thirty-three (33) Citizens on Patrol (COP's) and an average of twenty-two (22) Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS).

During 2022 the Citizens on Patrol volunteered 4,132 hours and the Volunteers in Police Service volunteered 1,076 hours. The combined total of citizen volunteer hours through the Fresno Police Department during 2022 was 5,208 hours.

CRIME SCENE INVESTIGATIONS SECTION STATISTICAL INFORMATION

Twenty-four Crime Scene Investigation Section (CSIS) technicians provide specialized crime scene investigation and forensic support services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

In 2022, the CSI Section responded to approximately 4,600 crimes scenes.

SKYWATCH STATISTICAL INFORMATION

The Fresno Police Department's Air Support Unit, also known as Skywatch, consists of one sergeant, five police officers, and two civilian aircraft maintenance technicians. The unit's lead maintenance technician was selected by the Airborne Public Safety Association (APSA) to be the sole recipient of the 2022 "Technical Specialist of the Year".

Members of the Air Support Unit flew over 1,500 hours in 2022. They assisted with more than 3,200 calls for service and were first to arrive on scene in over 2,100 of those calls. The average response time to a call was 50 seconds.



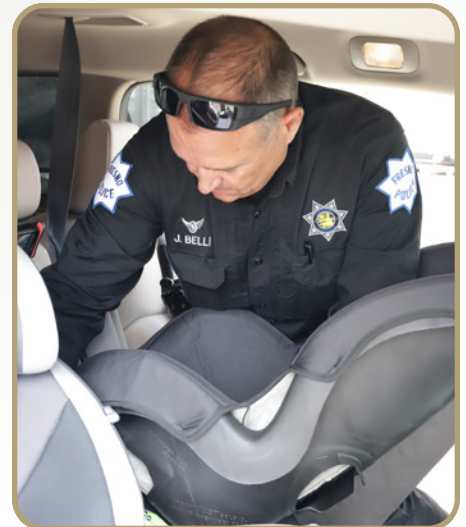
TRAFFIC SAFETY/SUPPORT SERVICES SECTION

TRAFFIC BUREAU

The Fresno Police Department Traffic Safety & Support Services Section is led by one Lieutenant and employs five Sergeants, 40 Motor-Officers including seven Detectives and additional administrative staff.

The roles of these men and women span from stabilizing and investigating over 3500 traffic collisions annually, to implementing

traffic functions for all major community events. In 2022, nearly 23,000 traffic citations were issued, an 18% increase over 2021's 19,000. Traffic's Special Events Unit provides a full complement of planning and enforcement around situations of civil unrest, to include crowd management, mutual aid, and dignitary protection.





INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES DIVISION

The Investigative Division consists of the Street Violence Bureau, the Multi Agency Gang Enforcement Consortium (MAGEC), Special Investigation Bureau and the Family Justice Bureau. SVB, MAGEC, and SIB are responsible for around-the-clock follow-up investigation on violent crimes occurring in the City ranging from murders to shootings. The Division led daily, weekly and monthly large scale and small-scale gang, crime, drug and human trafficking operations impacting the crime rate. The Division provided timely gang intelligence to officers in the Patrol and Support Divisions, which prevented violent crime this past year. The FJB was tasked in solving domestic violence, child abuse, sex crimes, elder abuse, and financial crimes. The Division enjoyed a strong working relationship through formalized task forces with our local, state and federal partners. Working with a sense of urgency has been a hallmark for the Division this past year.

FAMILY JUSTICE BUREAU

The Family Justice Bureau comprises five units investigating crimes directly impacting the family structure. The units include Domestic Violence, Sexual Assault, PC 290/Cold Case Unit, Child Abuse/Missing Person, and Financial Crimes/Elder Abuse. The Domestic Violence Unit has seven detectives investigating all domestic violence ranging from general incidents to felony domestic violence. The Sexual Assault Unit consists of six detectives investigating sexual assaults. They investigated 1390 cases in 2022. The PC 290/ Cold Case has seven detectives that monitor 1,700 sexual registrants within the City of Fresno and investigate cold case sexual assaults. Child Abuse/Missing person has seven Detectives. They investigate any child abuse and missing person reports within the city limits. Last year they investigated 1172 child abuse cases and 3372 missing persons cases. Finally, Financial Crimes Unit has two detectives investigating financial crimes and elder abuse.



SPECIAL INVESTIGATIONS BUREAU

The Special Investigation Bureau's Vice Unit completed its evolution from a traditional Vice Unit to a Human Trafficking investigative unit focused on rescuing victims of human trafficking and seeking successful prosecution of their capturers. To accomplish this new focus, the Vice unit created partnerships with the FBI, Homeland Security, and community-based outreach organizations such as Breaking the Chains and Fresno EOC. In 2022, the Unit and its partners conducted 86 operations resulting in 102 victims being rescued, made 55 felony arrests, and 35 human trafficking arrests; 29 of those 35 trafficking arrests were gang members and executed 109 search warrants. While many of those arrests are still being adjudicated, three HT suspects recently received pleas totaling 26 years in prison.

Due to the rise in violent crime in 2021, the Special Investigation Bureau Major Narcotics Unit re-focused its attention from large-scale drug trafficking organizations to illegal gun distributors in our community and gang members selling guns and narcotics. The Major Narcotic Unit teamed up with the Drug Enforcement Agency, Homeland Security, the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives (ATF), and the California Bureau of Cannabis to expand their impact on those committing violent crimes in our community. In 2022, undercover operations targeting illegal gun distributors netted 125 state and federal arrests, seized 93 firearms, arrested 39 influential gang members with guns, and recovered 3800 pounds of marijuana and 89,000 fentanyl pills from 88 search warrant operations.

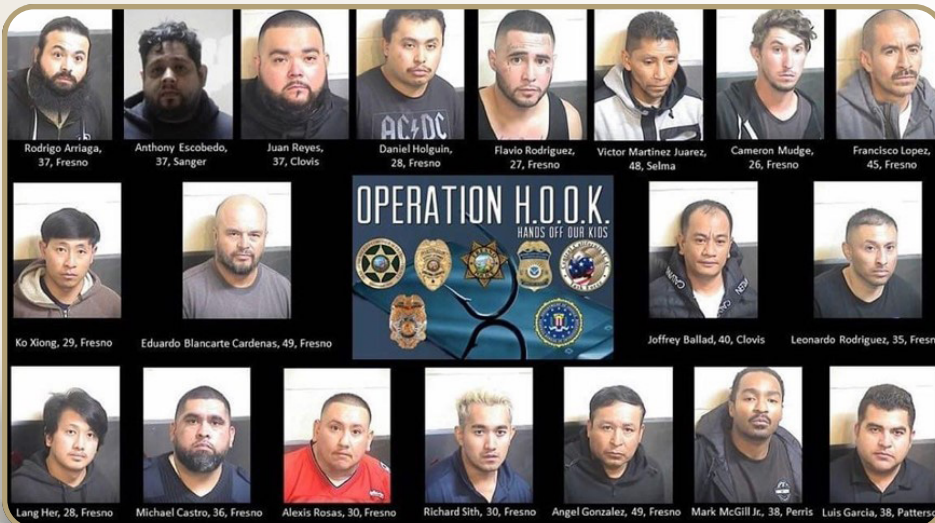

STREET VIOLENCE BUREAU

The Street Violence Bureau comprises the Homicide Unit, Felony Assault Unit, SVB Tactical Team, and the Night Detective Unit. Investigators in these units work around the clock to provide an immediate and focused response to violent crimes committed in our city. When a violent crime occurs, the Night Detective Unit or Felony Assault Unit (FAU) is usually the first investigative unit to respond.

They coordinate the response of other units (Homicide, Tac Team/MAGEC/SIB). The result is a mass-coordinated investigative response where the case is often solved or investigative tactics are developed to disrupt the issue. When a suspect is identified, the Tactical Team, specializing in surveillance techniques and tactics, is called in to quickly apprehend the suspect(s).



M.A.G.E.C. – METRO INVESTIGATIONS AND TACTICAL TEAM

The mission of M.A.G.E.C. is to eradicate the criminal activity of street gangs whose members threaten, terrorize, and commit a multitude of crimes against the peaceful citizens of their neighborhoods, schools, and businesses.

MAGEC’s goal is to disrupt and dismantle gang violence in Fresno. In 2022, MAGEC made 349 felony arrests, served 282 search warrants, and removed 181 firearms, leading the Investigations Division. MAGEC played a chief role in our intelligence-led effort to fight violent crime last year. Due to their around-the-clock intelligence gathering, dozens of shootings were prevented throughout the year. Also, under the MAGEC operational structure is the Department’s participation in the Adult Compliance Team. The ACT team has played a significant role in our crime-fighting efforts.

MAGEC conducted the largest wiretap investigation in the State of California’s history. Operation “No Fly Zone” was a 5-month investigation that targeted the Flyboys and

107 Hoover gangs. These gangs were responsible for numerous gang-related shootings and homicides in our city. The investigation dismantled the two violent gangs and resulted in 41 arrests and charges, including homicide, human trafficking, and illegal gun possession. This investigation highlighted the strong and unique collaboration involving our local, state, and federal partners.

MAGEC was instrumental in “Operation Lullaby.” MAGEC assisted SVB Homicide with a 10-day MAGEC investigation and a 2-week wire that resulted in two arrests for killing a young mother and her daughter. Those arrests would not have been made without MAGEC’s assistance and our partnerships with other agencies.
